(Dom. Press Special) ROME, June 19.—Albanians at Valona have rejected Italy's ultimatum and are preparing to launch a new attack upon the Italian garrison in the city, according to semi-official dispatches received today. Three thousand arditi have arrived to reinforce Italian troops at Valona.

Breaking Wireless Operators Strike

(Dom. Press Special) LONDON, June 19.—The Board of Trade has sanctioned the suspension of the regulation compelling vessels of 1,000 tons or more to carry wireless equipment. The suspension will continue in effect until the strike of wireless operators ends. The Cunard Line-Mauretania, will sail today, the company having obtained volunteer operators for the vessel's wireless. Marconi has issued notice that all strikers will be dismissed.

Senator Harding Accepts Challenge

(Dom. Press Special) WASHINGTON, June 19.—President Wilson's challenge to submit the peace to a referendum of the American people was accepted today by Senator Harding, Republican Presidential candidate. "I am sure," said Senator Harding, "the Republican party will gladly welcome a referendum upon the question of foreign relationship of this republic and the Republican attitude of preserved nationality will be overwhelmingly endorsed."

Irish Agitation Still Spreads

(Dom. Press Special) DUBLIN, June 19.—Sinn Feiners attacked the coastguard station at Skibberen, bombarding it with machine guns and rifle fire. The marines had anticipated the attack and were prepared. There were no casualties. Police Sergeant accompanied by eight constables entered railway train at Cork, but the engineer refused to proceed until the police had disembarked. There have been several such incidents lately.

300 Mexican Women Killed

(Dom. Press Special) MEXICO CITY, June 19.—Three hundred women camp followers attached to the government forces have been killed by order of Francisco Villa, bandit, according to Elidenetra today, quoting Jacinto Trueta, a wealth merchant of Jiminez, who states that the Chihuahua Excelsior prints a similar story but does not give the source of its information. According to Trueta, Villa captured the women during an encounter with the regiment of defacto cavalry between Parral and Jiminez. He ordered the women lined up for review to see whether any were soldiers masquerading. One woman shot twice at Villa but missed. Unable to learn the one who attacked him, Villa ordered all the women herded together and shot down. Trueta says Villa captured them and asked for his ransom 5000 pesos but he managed to escape.
