—SCHOOL CLOSED—Spring Valley School closed on Friday for a week, one case of diphtheria being reported and this precaution is being taken to prevent its further spread.—K

—COUNCIL MEETING—At the regular Council meeting last night Dr. Black, Veterinary Inspector, reported on the inspection of cattle slaughtered for butchers. Only one animal was found to be tuberculous during the year and it was destroyed. The Board of Health submitted a report showing that there is now not a single case of infectious disease in Summerside.—J.

—INSTRUCTIVE LECTURE—Rev. Mr. Bamford, Port Hill, delivered an interesting and instructive lecture on, How We Got Our Bible, in King George Hall, Port Hill, on Friday evening Dec. 5th. The Rev. Gentleman gave a review of the many attempts made to translate the Bible into the English language and eulogized the lives of those faithful Christian workers who by their adherence to their work succeeded in having the Holy Scriptures translated into the English language. At the close of the lecture short addresses were given by Messrs Wm. J. Montgomery and Hugh T. McKendrick. A duet given by Mr. and Mrs. James Millar was well received. A vote of thanks was tendered Rev. Mr. Bamford for his able interesting and instructive lecture to which he made a suitable reply. A silver collection was taken in aid of Bible Society.—F

—SERIOUS FIRE—On Saturday morning last the 6th inst., a two large barns belonging to Mr. Arthur Yeo, Tyne Valley, were with all their contents completely destroyed by fire. Mr. Yeo had been to the barn, had milked his cows and while in the house noticed smoke and on looking out saw that the barn was on fire. Some of the neighbors were soon on hand and his horses were let out but twelve cows, twelve sheep and five pigs were burned to death in the fire. A large amount of grain which had been threshed and left in the barn together with all his crop of hay was also burned. A large number of men soon gathered at the fire and it was with great difficulty that the dwelling house was saved. The two barns destroyed were large ones and both were in good repair one almost new. The loss to Mr. Yeo, especially at this time of year, is a very heavy one, as his barns were filled with feed. The cause or origin of the fire is unknown.—P

—ROADS AND ROAD MAKING—At the meeting of the Kensington League on Dec. 1st, the very important subject of Road and Road making was discussed. Rev. G. A. Sutherland gave a talk on the subject with illustrations on the black board. He stated that he had heard several Road-Masters say: "Give us the money and we'll give you the roads," but he insisted that if there was more real knowledge as to the principles and science of road making that the money used could be spent to better advantage. He dealt with the question of saturation of soil. The stagnant pool of water by the road-side meant danger. The soil under the road at the same level became saturated with water which worked its way upwards and left a bogging place in the road. After dealing with other phases of the question, Mr. Sutherland asked the opinion of those present as to the suggestion of a short course for Road-Masters, and all present agreed that such a course would give Road-Masters an opportunity of gaining valuable knowledge in this respect, and would be a benefit to all concerned.—K

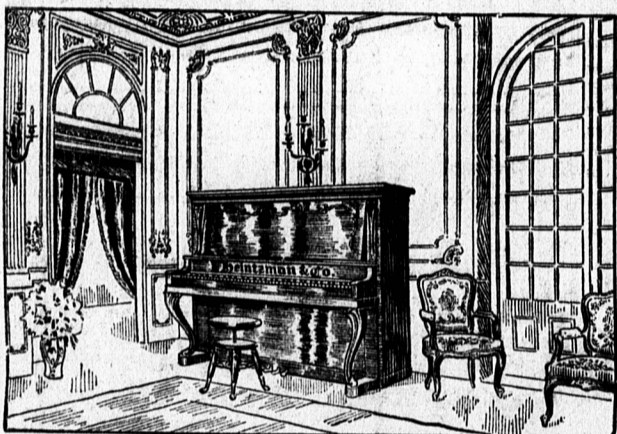
