## Noted Passengers Due at New York

(Special to the Guardian)

**MONTREAL, Aug. 24.**—The Robert (Ford) Co. was notified that the Cunarder Carmania was due to arrive at Halifax Sunday enroute for New York. Amongst the passengers on the Carmania is Prince Reginald Decroy of Belgium who is on his way to join the Belgian legation at Washington. Prince Decroy will be remembered for his efforts during the German invasion of Belgium to save the life of nurse Cavell. Other passengers include Sir Allan J. Sykes, Bart M. P. and His Excellency the Hon. D. E. King, President of Siberia who is on his way to New York. The Carmania is also bringing back a number of repatriated Imperial officers and other ranks who are returning direct to their homes in the United States after having served throughout the war with the Imperial army.

## German Polish Situation Takes New Turn

(Special to the Guardian)

**BERLIN, Aug. 24.**—The German Polish situation took on an unexpected aspect yesterday when it was announced that an inter-Allied mission would leave this city for Upper Silesia today. It was announced at the same time that the Polish Commission which has been conferring with German Government officials will return to Warsaw and make a report.

This new development was the direct outcome of action by the Poles who on Wednesday interpreted negotiations with Germany claiming the Upper Silesian situation was such that further deliberations were impossible. It was evident that this action came as a surprise to entente representatives here. General Dupont, Commandant of the Inter-Allied Commission here expressed his sole authority at present in Upper Silesia.

## German Assembly Proceeds to Trial Of the War Guilty

**BERLIN, Thursday, Aug. 22.**—The German National Assembly's committee to investigate the matter of responsibility for the war was named today. Herr Paterson, a Democrat, was made president of the committee, and Dr. Peter Spahn, a Centrist leader, was named as the vice-president. The sessions of the war guilt committee will be public, it was announced. The assembly also appointed a new foreign affairs committee with Philipp Scheidemann as president. The committee will be composed of five Social Democrats, three Centrists, three Democrats, two German-Nationalists and one member of the People's party.

## British Losses Heavy In The War

**LONDON, Aug. 22.**—The report of the War Cabinet for 1918, summarized as follows the Empire's war effort. The strength of the regular army, reserve and territorial force on the fourth of August, 1914, was 733,514. England has since recruited 4,006,158 men.

With other enlistments in the United Kingdom and Canada the total white enlistments in the whole Empire were 7,130,280. The figures of enlistment for races other than white including 1,250,000 from India, were 1,524,187, giving a grand total for all the races of the Empire of 8,654,467. In addition to these Chinese and other labor units were raised for service in Saloniki, Egypt and Mesopotamia.

## Britain Gives Coal to Italy

**ROME, Aug. 24.**—Promise of relief in Italy's coal famine was given to the cabinet today by Signor Schanzer, Minister of the Treasury, who has returned from London, Great Britain. Schanzer said Britain promised him she would send half a million tons of coal to Italy as soon as possible.

## Fought to Keep Him Out of Army

**WINNIPEG, August 22.**—Harold F. Hutchings, son of E. F. Hutchings' millionaire manufacturer, Wellington Crescent, who fought in several courts two years ago against his son being conscripted, but failed, is to be married this month in England to Miss Vera Ramsay, widely known in England as a golf player.

After the wedding Mr. and Mrs. Hutchings will embark in an airplane for a honeymoon trip to Italy, Switzerland and Belgium. Following a few weeks' visit on the Riviera they will come by way of the United States to Winnipeg, where they will make their home.

Miss Ramsay, whose home is at Leatherhead, Surrey, came to America in 1914 on the Lusitania, on the last voyage the ill-fated vessel made from England before it was destroyed by the Germans. She won the Boston women's golf championship, but on the eve of trying for the American women's championship she sprained her knee, which prevented playing then and still bothers her. On her return to England she entered the service of the Women's Royal Air Force, and while engaged in war work suffered a broken wrist that has interfered greatly with her golf. Notwithstanding these handicaps she still holds a high place in golf circles in the Old Country.

Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Hutchings, parents of Harold, sailed from New York last Thursday for England to attend the wedding. Hutchings offered to subscribe for half a million in war bonds of his son were exempted. He had to serve in the army, however.

**REGENERATION OF WASTE PAPER.**

(Conservation.)

During the war, in many places in Canada, organizations of patriotic workers undertook the collection of waste paper, with a two-fold object, namely, the revenue derived therefrom and relieving material.

It would be difficult to secure an estimate of the value of the waste paper collected, but it amounted to many thousands of tons.

As a forest conservation measure, this work was a tremendous success. Every ton of waste paper sold relieved the forest of supplying new material to take its place. Eight trees of 9-inch butt are required to make one cord of pulpwood, and one cord of pulpwood makes one ton of pulp. We are proud of our rapidly growing pulp and paper industry, but few realize what a drain this means to the forest.

Dr. C. D. Howe, in reporting on the Commission survey of forest regeneration at the last annual meeting of the Commission of Conservation, said:

"The studies of the past summer corroborate the results of the previous summer, namely, that the young balsam and spruce under the cover of the hardwoods grow very slowly. For example, the average 4-inch balsam was found to be 55 years old, the average 3-inch tree 70 years old, and it was 80 years old at 10 inches in diameter breast-high. This statement is based on the growth analysis of about 300 years. The spruce grows even more slowly. At 4 inches in diameter breast-high, the average tree was found to be 80 years old at 8 inches in diameter, 120 years old, and at 12 inches in diameter 165 years old."

Thus, to supply the raw material for one ton of pulp will require eight balsam trees of 75 years growth, or eight spruce trees of 130 years growth, or 600 and 1,040 years, respectively of tree growth.

Today the market price of waste paper is somewhat lower than during the war, but there is a steady demand for it, and by organized gathering, a good revenue may be derived, the drain on our forests may be partially relieved and, in a measure, the reputation of Canadians as a nation of wasters, may be discredited.
