Six French Aviators Killed

(Canadian Press) BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 28.—A despatch to the La Nacion from Tangier, Morocco, says that six French aviators were killed when their plane, one of a squadron of five, crashed in flames 40 miles from the town of Beni. The despatch says the plane fell 3,000 metres wrapped in flames, and that the fliers, a lieutenant, a sergeant, three non-commissioned officers and radio operator were completely charred. They were buried today. The planes left Fez yesterday morning, according to the despatch.
