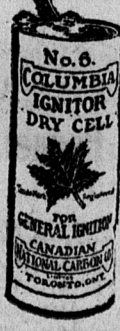

J. STUART BLACKTON SAYS NEW PRODUCTION "MISSING" IS THE BEST OF HIS CAREER

"Master of Screencraft" States in Interview That Its Theme is Patriotic and Ennobling Exceptionally Dramatic.

J. Stuart Blackton, known as the "Master of Screencraft," producer for Paramount of "Missing," his latest translation to the screen of a popular novel by Mrs. Humphrey Ward, the noted English novelist, which will be played at the Prince Edward Theatre today Thursday, declares that this is probably the most important production of his career.
