On the morning of the 9th of Nov.

our Infantry raided German trenches on a front of 200 yds. and I was observing the fire of our guns on his trenches when suddenly a shell just landed on my left about 60 yds. from where I was standing. There was three of us, another officer a telephone and myself, a small piece of shell entered my neck about one inch below the left ear. Fortunately the place where we were standing was German territory a few weeks ago and there was a deep German dugout a few yds. from us so you bet we got in there and another officer gave me 1st aid. We had to stay there till "Fritz" calmed down which was about an hour or more. Then we went in a "dressing station" then to the "base" where I am at present in the "Liverpool Merchants Hospital". I will be well in a short time and expect to be with my unit before the end of the month. They are leaving the steel in my neck, for a souvenir as they claim it will work out itself so "I should worry". Received your letters of Oct. 5th and 29th on 8th November pleased to hear you are all well hope I'll receive your Xmas box all right, trusting you will have an enjoyable trip to the Coast and wishing you all the "compliments of the season". I will close. With Love from JACK.
