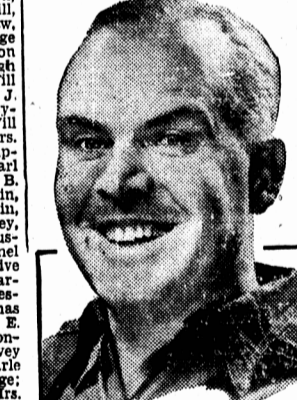

**NEW CANADIAN LIFETIME CHAMPION**

A new Canadian Record for lifetime production of both milk and fat on twice-a-day milking was made by the Gold Medal Holstein cow, Meadowbrae Echo Rosebud, owned by Q. D. Whale, Alma, Ontario. Starting on test as a two-year-old she has produced 208,810 lbs. milk containing 6,364 lbs. fat in twelve lactations. Her latest record was started as a fourteen-year-old she giving 549 lbs. fat from 17,590 lbs. milk in 385 days. Her best yearly effort was made as a ten-year-old when she produced 20,352 lbs. milk containing 648 lbs. fat. Rosebud's fifteenth calf, a heifer,
