Mr. Wallace Higgins, President of the Maritime Board of Trade, interviewed yesterday by the Guardian reporter stated that Mr. F. C. Cornell, the Transportation Expert engaged by the Maritimes to prepare their Freight Rate case for the Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners, has established his headquarters at Moncton care of Moncton Board of Trade.

Mr. Cornell is desirous that all parties interested send him at the above address immediately written statements of their transportation grievances and disabilities such as are calculated to aid the Maritime Case.

This is a great effort and it is being watched with keenest interest by the rest of Canada. In addition to the general freight rate brief, it is necessary that a historical background be prepared against which this brief will show up boldly and clearly.

What we must prove is that the principle upon which general freight rates are constructed should not be and was never really intended to be applied to the all great movements, but the work of the Maritimes is confined to a special dispensation in the matter of freight rates. This is a quid pro quo for the sacrifices which Confederation involved for them.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 4.—Owing to the falling off in the demand from exporters for Canadian grain on the Montreal market today the volume of business transacted was small. In sympathy with the lower prices for oats in the Winnipeg futures market spot values for Canadian western grade were reduced 1/2 cent per bushel. There was some demand for the new crop of spring wheat flour and as the prices bid were in line with some millers views, sales of a few thousand sacks were made for October shipment, but the volume of business was not large and steady. The condition of the winter wheat flour market was unchanged, prices being fully maintained owing to the continuing small offerings from Ontario millers and the somewhat limited supplies available on spot. A very firm feeling prevailed in the milled market, owing to the continued steady demand from country buyers and the fact that stocks on spot were small. A weaker feeling developed in the market for standard grades of rolled oats and prices were reduced to 10 cents per bushel. There was a moderate demand for eggs and a moderate amount of business was done. Prices were steady. The butter market was without any new feature to note, prices were unchanged and the trade volume small. A weaker feeling developed in the cheese market and prices were reduced 1/4 to 1/2 cents per pound.

EGGS

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 4.—The egg market throughout Canada continued firm with little change noted today except from Edmonton where the market is reported as easy. Toronto and Montreal continue to show a strong undertone. A slight falling off in figures in New York and Chicago is noted following the steady prices which have held during the past week. Toronto jobbing specials 42 cents, firsts 39, firsts 36, seconds 32. Country shippers are paying extras 35, firsts 32, seconds 25.

Jazz Music Described As Abomination

TORONTO, Sept. 4.—Jazz music was described as an "abomination" by Colonel MacKenzie Regan, one of the Empire's greatest bandmasters, who spoke at the luncheon of directors of the Canadian National exhibition today.

Colonel Regan told of having asked his band to play a "jazz" number during a ball for the Prince of Wales after Queen Mary had inquired concerning this music. "Afterwards the Queen said to me she never wanted to hear jazz again."

Colonel A. E. Gooderham, of the Toronto conservatory of music said that Eastern Canada was far behind in recognizing the value of cultural music, and regretted that music had no part in the high school system, particularly in eastern Ontario.
