2 oranges 1 tsp. lemon juice 1 cup sugar 1 large ripe banana One-fourth cup berry sugar Few drops vanilla extract Few drops almond extract Few grains salt Half cup whipping cream Squeeze the orange and the lemon juice and mix. Add the 4 tsp. sugar and stir till dissolved. Then place an equal amount of the mixture in each of four sherbert glasses. Slice the banana and divide between the sherberts. Chill. When serving whip the cream and add the salt and flavoring and the one-quarter cup berry sugar. Top each sherbert glass with a spoonful of this mixture and garnish with a cherry. Serves 4.

PINEAPPLE OATMEAL BARS. 1-2 cup butter 1 cup light brown sugar 1 cup oatmeal 1 cup flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1-2 teaspoon salt Cream butter and sugar, add oatmeal mixing well. Sift and measure flour and stir again with the baking powder and salt, add to cream mixture. Press half of the crumb mixture firmly into a greased and floured pan, making the layer about 1-4 inch thick. Spread with pineapple filling, cover with remaining crumbs. Press top down firmly. Bake at 350° F. for 35 minutes. Allow to cool on cake rack, then cut in bars.

FILLING 1 cup crushed pineapple 1-4 cup sugar 1-4 teaspoon salt 3 tablespoons cornstarch 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1 egg 1 tablespoon butter Beat egg until light and fluffy. Combine sugar, salt and cornstarch, add to beaten egg, mixing well. Add lemon juice, and crushed pineapple, mix well and cook over boiling water stirring constantly until thickened. Remove from the heat and add butter, beating well. Cool slightly before using.

Then when people came to call on hot afternoons she produced these tasty discs along with a big pitcher of ice-cold pink lemonade. GRANDMA'S COOKIES ARE EASY TO MAKE No cookie was ever baked that was any tastier, any more satisfying than the round, spiky cartwheels that grandmother used to turn out. Filled with nuts and spices, and adorned with a big, fat raisin, they left your mouth watering as they came out of the oven. Luckily, they take short time to put together and only ten minutes to bake. GRANDMOTHER'S COOKIES 1 cup shortening 1 cup sugar 1 teaspoon soda 1 cup molasses 2 cups All-Bran 1/2 cup finely chopped nut meats 5 cups flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons cinnamon 1 teaspoon cloves 1/2 teaspoon ginger 2-3 cup water Blend shortening and sugar gradually. Combine soda with molasses and add to first mixture; beat well. Add Bran and nuts. Stir flour with baking powder, salt, cinnamon, cloves and ginger and add to creamed mixture alternately with water. Chill thoroughly. Roll dough to about one-eighth inch thickness and cut with cookie cutter. Place raisin or small amount of jelly in center if desired. Bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 10 minutes. Yields 4 dozen cookies (3 1/2 inches in diameter).

Butter a covered baking dish, spread a layer of rhubarb over the bottom, sprinkle a layer of sugar, then add another layer of rhubarb, and so on until the dish is filled. Sprinkle sugar over the top, then add small pieces of butter and the grated rind of lemon. Cover the dish and bake slowly until the fruit is tender. Long, slow baking gives rhubarb a rich red colour.
