Time.—The Greeks visited Jesus either on the evening of the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, or (more probably) just before he left the temple. Tuesday, April 4. A. D. 30.
Place.—The temple in Jerusalem.

LESSON HELPS.
 20. "Certain Greeks"—Men of Greek blood who had given up idolatry and yet were not fully Jews. They did believe in the one God of Israel. "At the feast"—Feast of the passover.

21. "Came . . . to Phillip"—His name is a Grecian name, therefore they came to him. "We would see Jesus"—Not only see him, but hear his teachings. Whether Jesus met them or not is not recorded.

23. "The hour is come"—The hour, not of earthly triumph, but of earthly sorrow ending in the death upon the cross. "Should be glorified"—The path of the cross, though dark, proved to be the path of glory ending in light.

24. "A corn of wheat"—That is a kernel or grain of wheat. "If it die, it bringeth forth much fruit"—This is the law of the harvest. It is the law of the moral world as well as the material. Death may end in more abundant life.

25. "Loveth his life shall lose it"—This is true of the intensely selfish man. A worldly life is not a spiritual nor an eternal one. "He that hateth his life"—That is, counts it of little worth compared with the high interests of the eternal life.

26. "Follow me"—That is, not simply walk after Christ, but live in his spirit. "If an man serve me, him will my Father honour"—As God exalted his Son, who was patient to death, so he will exalt the true disciples of Christ.

27. "Now is my soul troubled"—Soul here is in contrast with the word "Spirit" to mark the sensitive part of one's nature. "Father, save me from this hour"—His possible prayer, but he was submissive to the Father's will. "For that cause"—That which sustained him with the feeling that he was patient in suffering. It was the will of the Father.

28. The victory now comes to Jesus—the victory through prayer. The glory of God shines out in the atonement of Christ.

29. The different nature of the people shows that some were more spiritually minded than others.

30. "For your sakes"—That Jesus might be glorified by the people.

31. "Now"—That is, at the period of his suffering and resurrection. "Prince of this world"—That is, Satan, who ruled the earth through the fall of the first Adam, and will be ruled by the triumph of the second Adam, Jesus Christ.

33. "Will draw all men unto me"—The cross is the powerful magnet which attracts human hearts. Christ draws, not compels. His great act of love for a sinful race, and as the race feels this it turns in affection to him.

THE DALHOUSIE COLLEGE

Guardian's Representative Reviews the Days Since the Xmas Holidays.

The majority of the students have returned, after having spent their holidays at their own homes or at the homes of their friends, and are settling themselves down to their studies for another term. The results of the recent examinations have formed the topic of conversation for the past few days. In these examinations the Island students in their respective years have taken a good standing. In several cases they have led their classes, while a goodly number of them have either taken first class rank or have reached a high standing in the second class rank. When it was learned that the returning troops of the Second Contingent were to land on Wednesday, that day was proclaimed a holiday in the College. Halifax had been making preparations for their return and consequently presented quite a gay appearance. Tricolor flags could be seen floating in all directions. In the fore part of the day numerous salutes were fired in honor of their arrival. About 12 a. m. the soldiers all disembarked, soon formed the line and marched through the principal streets of the city. At length they reached the armory when they received a royal

welcome. In the afternoon many of the soldiers left for their homes in the various provinces, while those remained could be seen floating about the streets. In many cases—sad to say—they apparently had imbibed too much "fire water" and were not altogether accountable for the way they were acting.

On the evening of Friday, Jan. 11th, Professor Stockley of the University of New Brunswick, lectured in Dalhousie College, under the auspices of the Sodales Debating Society. The subject was "The Patriotism of Shakespeare." Mr. Stockley treated it in a masterly way and none could fail to see that the learned professor had a knowledge of the writings of the great dramatist. At the close comments were made on the lecture by Dr. Forest and Professors MacGregor, Murray and MacMechan. A vote of thanks was moved by G. H. Sedgwick and seconded by L. J. Miller. The vote was carried unanimously. The meeting closed by the singing of the National Anthem.

HOME FROM CALIFORNIA.

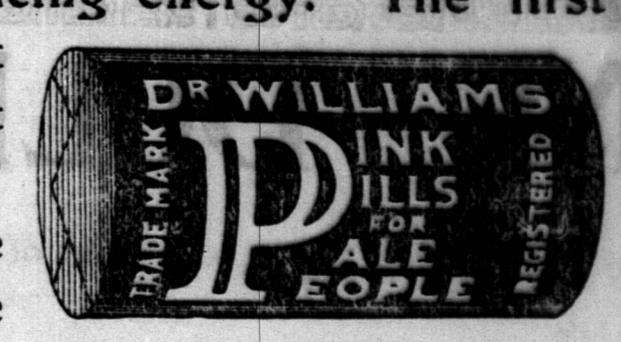
