## THE MARKETS

**MONTREAL**, Que., June 7.—There was some demand from foreign buyers for Canadian wheat in the Montreal market today and sales of a few odd loads were made. The only business of importance reported in cash grain in the local market was the sale of a few loads of No. 3 northern wheat for export account. A stronger feeling prevailed in the market for Canadian western oats and prices were advanced one to two cents per bushel. Sales of carlots of No. 2 C.W. were made at 74, and No. 3 C.W. at 70 c. per bushel in sympathy with the renewed strength in the Winnipeg cash wheat market, the local situation for spring wheat grades of flour was stronger, and prices were marked up ten cents per barrel. First patents were quoted at \$8.90, second patents \$8.40 and strong bakers at \$8.20 per barrel. The demand was quiet. The demand for winter wheat flour continued quiet but the undertone was firm, a feature of the millfeed trade was the inquiry from the United States for bran and shorts and as the prices bid were from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per ton higher than local values some business was transacted. There was no change in the condition of the local market, prices being unchanged with a moderate trade passing. Owing to the recent weakness in oats prices for standard grades of rolled oats were reduced ten cents to \$3.85 per bag of ninety pounds per bag. Sales were made at \$3.75 delivered to the trade.

The undertone to the egg market was firm and the trade was moderately active. The receipts were 3,493 cases. A firmer prevailed in the potato market under an improved demand. Carlots of Queen White "B" grade were sold at \$2.35 to \$2.40 per bag and reds at \$1.90 to \$1.95 per bag of 90 lbs in number of others of the crew of the Patriot took a trip South on the 15th inst. for Montreal. It is hoped to again include Summerside on the Summer itinerary of this ship.

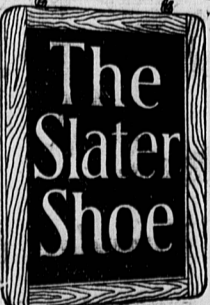

### Fighting The White Plague In P. E. I.

NO. 13

In order to make any appreciable head way in reducing the large death rate caused by consumption in P. E. I. we should have hospital and sanatorium beds equal to the number of yearly deaths.

Statistics show that countries having the lowest death rates from tuberculosis have the largest number of beds according to the yearly deaths, and the countries having the highest death rates have a low number of beds for the control of tuberculosis, for instance—

JAPAN—Has less than one bed for every 40 deaths, and a death rate of 213 per 100,000 of population.

GERMANY—Has 4 beds for every 10 deaths, and a death rate of 133 per 100,000 of population.

NEW ZEALAND—Has 9 beds for every 10 T. B. deaths, and a death rate of 51 per 100,000 of population.

In Prince Edward Island we have not a single bed for Tuberculosis Cases.
