BENNETT RAISES NATIONAL PARK ISSUE

AUSTRO-GERMAN ALLIANCE TAKES SHAPE

AUSTRIAN NAZIS GIVEN CABINET POSTS

Threat To Rome-Berlin Axis Seen In Austrian Cabinet Shake-up.

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) VIENNA, Feb. 15.—The cabinet of Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg was revised tonight with the appointment of two ministers sympathetic toward Nazi Germany. Dr. Arthur von Seydewitz, who enjoys the confidence of Chancellor Hitler of Germany, was named Minister of Interior, a post in which he will control Austria's police force. An exponent of pan-Germanism—closer union of the two German-speaking peoples—Professor Adamovich, was made Minister of Justice. A third German sympathizer, Dr. Edmund Glaise-Horselenau, was appointed to the revised cabinet as Minister without portfolio. Another newcomer to the cabinet was Ludwig Raab, named Minister of Commerce, a long-time friend of the late Chancellor Engelbert Dollfus. Raab's appointment was considered a measure to counter-balance Nazi influence in the new cabinet.

More Conservative

The reorganized cabinet, while representing a concession to Germany, was described as more conservative than had been expected. It was particularly noted that Chancellor von Schuschnigg himself retained the defence portfolio, which some sources reported Hitler had demanded for a pro-Nazi. The Chancellor gave up the foreign affairs portfolio to Dr. Guido Schmidt, whom he promoted to full ministerial rank. Dr. Schmidt is a long-time ally of the Austrian Nazis, although in practice he carried on the main duties of the foreign office.

Outcome of Parley

The dramatic move carried out plans made by the Austrian Chancellor and Hitler in a talk they had Saturday at Der Fuehrer's Berchtesgaden retreat, just across the Austrian frontier, for re-organizing the cabinet.

Scores Denial Of Appeal Right To Land Owners

Arbitrary Expropriation Procedure Denounced By Conservative Leader In Parliament.

OTTAWA, Feb. 15.—(CP)—Conservative Leader Bennett protested in the House of Commons tonight against the method of acquiring land for a National Park in Prince Edward Island. Mr. Bennett said the compensation allowed owners of the lands taken over was arbitrarily fixed by the Provincial Government. There was no provision for arbitration as in other cases where lands were expropriated for government or railway use.
