Unemployment In East Discussed

Is Critical Of Flag Design From P. E. Island

OTTAWA, May 13.—(CP)—The Labor and Reconstruction Departments are studying ways of relieving the unemployment situation in the Maritimes, Labor Minister Mitchell said tonight in the Commons.

He was replying to Clarence Gillis (CPC-Cape Breton South) who asked if the Government was considering the extension of unemployment insurance benefits and out-of-work benefits because of the widespread unemployment on Cape Breton Island.

Mr. Mitchell said there was a shortage of some types of workers in the Maritimes but those who were unemployed could not fill them. The Labor Department was making transportation available to transfer workers to places where they could work. However, the possibility of transfer were not good in the Maritimes.

"There was a movement of some Cape Breton workers to Maine for factory work there. Other employment was expected to become available at Sydney.

"The Minister said the Dominion proposals to the Provinces contained an offer by the Dominion to employ the unemployed in the Maritimes. Until agreement was reached these persons were primarily the responsibility of municipalities and provinces.

Begin Shipping Milk From Summerside To Nfld.

Plane Took Off Yesterday With 200 Gallons

S'side Budgets For Surplus Of \$829

Seek Medal For Automobile Trip

Twice-Weekly Trips Will Be Made; Plan To Ship Eggs By Air Also.

A CWT U. S. Army Transport Command plane took off from Summerside airport late yesterday afternoon to inaugurate what may be the most profitable export trade in farm produce between Prince Edward Island and United States army bases in Newfoundland. The plane was from Harmon field, Steveston, Newfoundland and it carried a cargo of 200 gallons of fresh milk to U. S. troops.

Two trips will be made each week and each time 200 gallons of milk will be carried along with quantities of fresh eggs if they are able to be obtained. About the middle of March this year U. S. army officers first arrived on the island seeking to obtain fresh milk.

Unable to procure it in Charlottetown they went to Summerside and Mr. Elmer Offer, proprietor of the Ideal Dairy under took to fill their order. Their medical officer inspected his plant and found it satisfactory. A sample of milk was taken away and it passed the very strict U. S. army test. Mr. Offer was then advised that he was prepared to take 800 gallons a week.

However, a number of obstacles lurked in the way. The milk was ironed out but at the last minute an export permit was refused by the Dairy Products Board. Determined to obtain fresh milk, the offer, at Harmon field were not easily discouraged and efforts were made to obtain permits through diplomatic channels to have the permit granted. Their efforts were finally successful and the first shipment was made yesterday.—S.

Big Money Man

(By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, May 13.—(Urchin) Spud) Arsenault showed his hand when he said he had struck a great find of gold in the Yukon and said for posterity, "It doesn't excite me any."

Spud, who is mildly, hit the jackpot. He received the money here, along with 250,000 shares of Yukon stock, in return for title to his claims some 50 miles north of Yellowknife.

"I've never made that much money before and I'm going to look after it," Spud said. "I'm having it transferred to Edmonton."

Native Of Wellington

Native of Wellington, P. E. I., and veteran of the First Great War, Spud returned last July to his home town and he wanted to have another look at them.

He found enough gold to satisfy himself he "had something." He returned to a civilization, recorded the claims, then set his own price.

He has made other strikes but never as rich. He started work as a fire ranger and worked seven years from Fort Macmillan to Lake Athabasca, and started prospecting 17 years ago.

Buctoche Village Threatened By Fire

BUCTOCHE, N. B., May 13.—The eastern end of this village was threatened this afternoon by a blaze which destroyed a barn at the rear of the Hotel Bellevue, owned by A. F. Hebert, causing damage estimated at \$5,000.

The fire broke out at 2:15 p.m. and was fought for two hours by volunteer firemen who used village equipment and pumps from the nearby E. C. Irving station.

OTTAWA, May 13.—(CP)—Resources Minister Glen held out in the Commons today the hope that ultimately the Canadian Indian will be able to assume the "full rights and responsibilities" of democratic citizenship while retaining and developing many of his native characteristics.

Mr. Glen spoke in moving a Government resolution for the establishment of a Joint Senate-Commons committee to study the Indian Act and recommend changes to improve the lot of the red man. The committee will include 22 members of the Commons.

Before the House adopted the motion, expressions of approval were heard from a group of Western members.

Mr. Glen said it would appear that Canada had reached a stage in her development as a nation when economic conditions forced her to do one of two things—

1. Purchase at public expense the additional lands and additional hunting and trapping rights for an Indian population of 128,000, increasing at a rate of 1,500 a year,

Declare Spain Geared For War

NEW YORK, May 13.—(AP)—Francisco Spain is "a fascist regime geared for war and bent on aggression," the Spanish Government-in-exile said today. It declared Spain was a haven for notorious Gestapo agents and Nazi scientists working on atomic energy.

These charges are included in a 360-page document consisting of a general introduction and 20 annexes, brought from Paris Sunday by Dr. Jose Giral, premier of the government-in-exile, for submission to the United Nations Security Council.

Dr. Giral said the document would be handed to Secretary-General Trygve Lie within the next 24 hours and that it would prove that the Franco regime had always been a permanent threat to international peace and security.

Fatally Injured By Skyrocket

(By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, May 13.—Nineteen-year-old Walter Zank, struck on the head last night by a portion of a rocket, was killed by a rocket and skyrocket battle between two gangs of youths died this afternoon. A bystander, he was taken to hospital after a rocket struck him from the sky and imbedded itself in his head.

Police said they learned Zank and two companions were talking near a cafe in the Clinton-Collegiate districts of West Toronto when several rockets fell.

Police, who rounded up a number of boys in the area for questioning, said 19 rockets were fired last night from street car tracks and milk bottles in the area. Observations of Toronto Transport Commission street cars reported seeing the range warfare going on for the last week. The rival groups set off rockets and hurled giant firecrackers at each other. Some fell under the trams and exploded with loud reports which startled passengers. T.O.C. officials said one giant firecracker was tossed into a street car, causing considerable confusion.

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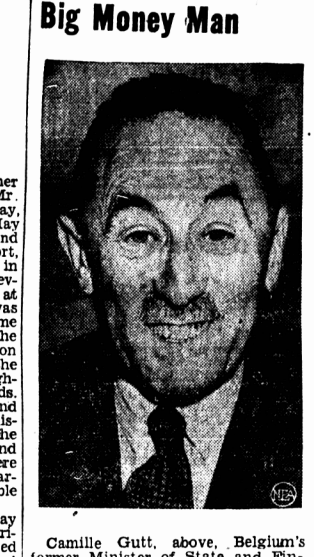

Farmers Protest Fast Time At Montague

A strong delegation of farmers from New Perth, Union Road, and other nearby communities took time off yesterday to wait upon the Town Council of Montague to ask the Council to revoke its former proclamation instituting daylight saving time in that town.

Mayor Marshall Reynolds said his Council received the delegation and that he was sure the Council would do its best to put it into effect as soon as possible.

Mr. Lincoln Dewar, spokesman for the delegation, stated that the work of the farmers at the present time was as important as in the war years, so far as the saving of fuel is concerned. Unless farm production is maintained and even increased, Mr. Dewar said, millions in Europe may die. Under those circumstances, he said, it was very important that local regulations affecting the working hours of farm workers should be put into effect as soon as possible.

The delegation was of the opinion that the Provincial Government should be asked to make daylight saving time a province-wide regulation. Either that, or approval of the measure by the Council is now in force.

Others who participated in the delegation were Charles McMillan, Union Road; J. E. Fraser, Union Road; John Ancear, Lower Montague.

The Mayor and the other members of the Council promised to give the farmers' request their earnest consideration.

Seek Housing Solution At Acadia University

OTTAWA, May 13.—(CP)—The University of Acadia University is seeking a solution to the housing problem for its students.

The University, at Wolfville, some eight miles from the camp, already has acquired a Wolfville hotel and erected a new men's residence on the campus in an effort to solve the housing problem for its staff.
