**Evangelist Lectures**

The subject of Jonah and the whale experience was dealt with Sunday night in the Oddfellows' Hall by Evangelist P. W. Johnston in which he supported the authenticity of the story referring to the words of Christ in Matt. 12:40 where the Lord distinctly says that Jonah was three days and nights in the whale. He said that whoever discredits this story, thereby casts a reflection on the Lord Himself who not only endorsed the truthfulness of it but who in this scripture used it to illustrate his own burial and resurrection. To disprove the former would disprove the latter and no Christian can afford to do that.

Scientists so Mr. Johnston said deny the story of the whale swallowing Jonah, and say that it is impossible for a whale to swallow a man. The evangelist referred to where a fifteen foot shark was found in the stomach of a sperm whale. He told of a full grown whale that was caught and the contents of his stomach was sufficient to fill a large room.

He further described these monsters as being capable of swallowing substances of such enormous size swimming about with the lower jaw hanging down in its normal position and its huge gullet gapping like some submarine's own funnel which could have easily slipped that the whale could scarcely have known it. Mr. Johnston referred to a certain James Bartley who in February, 1861, was thrown overboard while hunting whales and was swallowed by one. The whale that swallowed him was caught and when they opened it to their surprise they found the man who was still alive but unconscious. They had much trouble in reviving him, and he was delirious for several days. When he recovered he told his horrible experience which Mr. Johnston related. These experiences he said prove conclusively that the Jonah and the whale experience was a possibility and unquestionably true.

The evangelist outlined the reasons why Jonah was compelled to go into this experience. He was willing to give an unfavorable message to Nineveh, a city of 120,000 inhabitants. It required some courage to tell the Ninevites that within forty days their city would be destroyed unless they repented. He spoke of the delivery of such a message and took the trip to Joppa which resulted in the almost fatal experience of losing his life. Having however repented while in the whale the Lord caused the whale to eject him and Jonah was only too willing to give the message afterward. Mr. Johnston said that even if the whale ordinarily was unable to swallow Jonah it would not even then discredit this experience for the record says that the Lord prepared this fish to swallow the prophet. This ought to settle it for any believer of the scripture.

But the thing that nettled Jonah

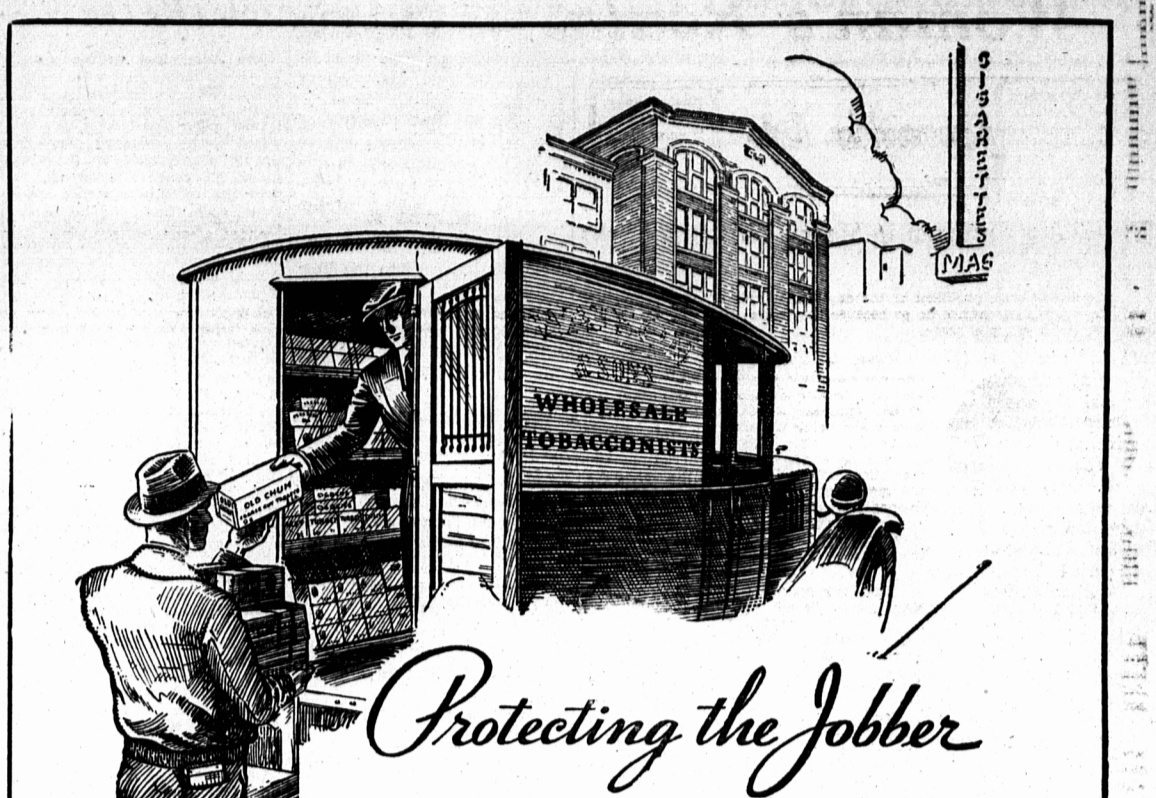

Thus when Jonah arrived as he did they were ready to receive his message. Mr. Johnston closed his remarks by saying that men should learn the lesson that will be entered into the hearts of those who should be obedient and that they should not make it necessary for God to put them through experiences in order to make them learn his ways.
