## Coalition Candidate Elected In Manitoba

MINNEDOSA, Man., Nov. 2.—(CP)—Election of H. S. Rungay, Coalition candidate in this Manitoba riding, was conceded tonight on the basis of returns from 22 1/2 of the constituency's 29 polls, which gave Mr. Rungay 2,340 votes and Ralph Frith, his C. C. F. opponent, 1,075.

The by-election was necessitated by the resignation of Dr. E. J. Rutledge, who represented the riding as a Progressive Conservative in the Province's 55-seat Legislature.

The election of Mr. Rungay, a Liberal-Progressive, makes the House standing Progressive Conservative 12; Liberal-Progressive 26; Independent 3; Social Credit 2; C.C.F. 10; Independent Progressive Conservatives 1; Labor-Progressive 1.

## Oil Tanker Burns In Quebec Harbor

QUEBEC, Nov. 2.—(CP)—An oil tanker was towed safely away from Sillery Wharf in the harbor here tonight after fire of unknown origin broke out aboard the ship as it was emptying its cargo into tanks of Dominion Oil Company.

The wharf blazed up in a matter of seconds, as the oil caught with the help of their fireproof Lanorae soon had the flames under control.

The fireship poured three streams of water on the tanker, the Britannube, listed in Lloyd's as owned by Britannube Ltd.

The Britannube is a 1,932-ton tanker built in England by Furness Company Ltd. in 1932.

MONTREAL, Nov. 2.—(CP)—Daniel McL. Brophy, 85, veteran of the Riel rebellion and postmaster for suburban Westmount for nearly 25 years until his retirement seven years ago, died here last night. He served with the Montreal Garrison Artillery in 1885 and went through the revolt. He was one of the few surviving members of that Corps. In 1915 he was appointed postmaster of Westmount and held that post until 1941.

## Child Gives Evidence In Ontario Murder Charge

SIMCOE, Ont., Nov. 2.—(CP)—Joanne Stewart, 13-year-old daughter of Lew Stuart who was killed here June 6, testified today she saw Seth Linton, who faces a double murder charge, strike her father twice with the butt of a rifle.

Linton, a 41-year-old well digger, is charged with the death of Stewart's father, plasterer, and John Kipp, 32, a Vienna, Ont., carpenter.

Crown Attorney C. P. Hope told the court today he would proceed first with the charge involving Stewart and that he would prove Stewart died of blows on the head and not from two bullet wounds in his abdomen. Both men were shot with a .22-calibre rifle at Linton's home near here.

Joanne Stewart said she and her mother lived with Linton for five years.

She testified her uncle, John Kipp, visited Linton the day of the shooting and that she heard the two quarrelling outside the house. She believed Linton had chased Kipp away, she added.

That night, the girl said, she

heard the voices of her uncle and her father outside the house. Linton leaned from a window and told them to go away. Then, the girl testified, she saw Linton take a .22-calibre rifle and push shells in it.

Joanne left the house and joined her mother who had left the house earlier. She heard glass in the front door being broken and then two shots. She and her mother ran across the road to get help from neighbors.

Looking from the neighbors' window, Joanne said she saw Linton strike her father twice on the head with a rifle as he lay on the ground.

Defence counsel asked the girl about a "strip tease" which she had allegedly performed before transient workers last summer at a nearby cannery. He said he was attempting to establish that the 13-year-old girl's evidence was unreliable.

The crown attorney described this line of questioning as "reprehensible" and after conferring with Mr. Justice A. M. LeBel defence counsel dropped the subject.

## Conference Called On Trans-Canada Highway

OTTAWA, Nov. 2.—(CP)—The long-held dream of a hard-surfaced, Trans-Canada Highway stretching from Atlantic to Pacific moved closer to reality today with the calling of a Dominion-Provincial conference to discuss its construction.

Resources Minister MacKinnon announced that invitations have been sent to the Provincial Premiers inviting them to come to Ottawa to open talks on the project. The invitations went out only a day or so ago and, as yet, no acceptances have been received.

Mr. MacKinnon said the date for the discussions has not been set but they will take place "in the very near future."

Provincial reaction to the announcement was prompt and spokesmen for several of the regional governments indicated they would send representatives to the conference.

The question of an all-Canada highway has been to the forefront of tourist and inter-governmental discussions for years but this is the first time steps have been taken to bring the Province and the Dominion into a conference on the roadway.

The problem was injected into the platform debates at the national Liberal convention here this summer and Trade Minister

Howe told the delegates it was a part of the Liberal Party platform.

Canada for years has lacked a part to the other. There are road links across the country but some, notably those in Northwestern Ontario, run through rough, uninhabited country and are in such poor conditions that Canadians motoring from Eastern to Western Canada choose to travel part of the way through the United States.

## Fog Prevents Pearson From Reaching Paris

LONDON, Nov. 2.—(CP)—Lester B. Pearson, Canadian External Affairs Minister, is back on the ground after flying around for several hours in a British fog—and getting nowhere while affairs of state waited.

Pearson was flying to Paris to take over leadership of the Canadian delegation to the United Nations from Transport Minister Lionel Chevrier.

After almost four hours blind flying in a fog blanketing parts of Britain and France his R. C. A. F. Dakota was finally diverted to the R. A. F. station at Basingbourne—just 40 miles from his London starting point.

## Night Watchman Dies Fighting Fire

METEGHAN, N. S., Nov. 2.—(CP)—Leslie LeBlanc, 55-year-old night watchman, died of a heart attack here today assisting firefighters battle a blaze which levelled a fish plant drying house and nearby dwellings.

LeBlanc, employed at Meteghan wharves, had been in poor health and collapsed during the excitement. Fire damage was estimated at more than \$20,000.
