DAN CARROLL HIGH SCORING MAY TAKE RANGER STAP ROY MITCHELL MAY BE TRADED

Hub Ringman Believes Colored Boy Has Championship Ability.

Many Changes Made in Rules; No More "Sudden Death" Play—Referee May Give Rest for "Ragging."

BOSTON, Oct. 17.—Believing that Roy Mitchell, the Nova Scotian light heavyweight, possesses championship ability despite his miserable showing in Hub rings, Dan Carroll, manager of Jim Maloney, Honeyboy Finnegan and a score of other boxers, has opened negotiations which he hopes will ultimately end in a signed contract binding the colored boy to his stable of fighters.

While no figures have been announced, Carroll does not deny that he would not consider \$10,000 unreasonably spent in "taking a chance" on Mitchell.

Mitchell is a mystery to local fight fans. Touted as a star of the first calibre, he was widely acclaimed as he won his two first local bouts. Then came the clash with Tom Sayers, of Detroit, who outweighed Mitchell by 40 pounds. The Nova Scotian appeared like a different boxer than in his previous local starts, and left the ring a badly defeated man.

After the Sayers battle, Mitchell never won a local fight, and what is worse, never put up a satisfactory battle.

Close followers of the fistie game refuse to heed the charge that Mitchell lacks courage and assert that poor matchmaking is chiefly responsible for his failure to advance.

Pitting Mitchell against a man 40 pounds heavier made Roy look bad before he had a chance to show his true worth, and Frankie Burns, his manager, has been the target for some sharp criticism.

That Mitchell is popular here is evidenced by the \$9,000 "gate" he drew at the Sayers bout, and from the fact that over 100 fans expected the losing habit, fans flocked to see him perform.

Under the watchful eye of a past master of the boxing game like Carroll, Mitchell is expected to go far in his quest for success, and Hub fans confidently expect the Nova Scotian punch-slinger to get a start in Hub rings under new surroundings.

GREATER WINNIPEG TO BENEFIT FROM POWER DEVELOPMENT

WINNIPEG, Man. Oct. 16.—Greater Winnipeg can look forward to a total investment of \$150,000,000 as a result of the development of power at Seven Sisters Falls, stated A. W. McLimont, president of the Winnipeg Electric Company, whose subsidiary the North Western Power Company, secured a lease to the Seven Sisters site from the Dominion government and is expending \$25,000,000 on what is claimed will be the most modern hydro-electric power plant on this continent.

Mr. McLimont, addressing the Young Men's Board of Trade based on his statement on the \$25,000,000 investment in the new plant. "As every dollar spent on the plant will cause at least \$5 to be spent in general industrial development, Greater Winnipeg can look forward to a total investment of \$150,000,000 as a result of the development of Seven Sisters."

"Statistics," he added, "reveal that for every 1,000 h. p. development in a community, work is provided for 385 employees, representing a payroll of \$80,000 and a total addition to the population of 2,000 souls.

"Using these figures in a very conservative manner we find that the power development at Seven Sisters Falls will give steady employment to over 50,000 wage earners, will increase our population by over 200,000 and will add \$50,000,000 per annum to Greater Winnipeg's payroll."

MOND NICKEL TO EXTEND OPERATIONS IN CANADA

NEW YORK, N. Y. SHEEP INDUSTRY BOOMS IN CANADA

TORONTO, Oct. 16.—The situation facing the sheep industry is very encouraging in both Eastern and Western Canada. Attention has been drawn to the manner in which the sheep industry is growing in the Rainy River district of Northern Ontario, a region where, it is claimed, pasture and climatic conditions are ideal and there is more land suited to sheep than to any other animals. From this corner of Ontario where 14,000 tons of wool came in 1927, there were 20,000 pounds in 1928, and shipments of lambs have increased from 500 in 1925 to 1,000 in 1927 and 1,800 in 1928. With regard to Western Canada, the statement of the General Manager of the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, Limited, may be quoted: "Never have I noticed such a permanent feeling of confidence as seems to exist among shepherms all through the Western Provinces this year. The most spectacular development has taken place in British Columbia, where farmers have doubled their sheep population in four years, and where there is room for 2,000, 000 sheep in the interior of the Province."

New Hockey Loop Formed in Quebec

QUEBEC, Oct. 17.—A new independent hockey league in the province of Quebec has been formed to include teams from Quebec City, Grand Mere, Three Rivers, L'Ange and Sherbrooke. It is expected that final plans for the season will be announced following a meeting of representatives of the various clubs at Three Rivers next Sunday. The new loop will not seek affiliation with the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association, but will play independent hockey. Frank Brophy, former Montreal amateur goalie, and later with the Quebec Bell Dogs in the National Hockey League, has been elected president of the new organization.

To Retire to Stock Farm

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Spencer, 159 3-4, joint holder of the world record for three-year-old trotters, will join the ranks of progenitors next year at the Castleton Farm, Lexington, Ky. The establishment is the property of his breeder and owner, David M. Look, of New York.

Spencer will be a companion in the stud to his sire, Lee Tide, 2:05, and Daystar, 2:05.

The colt will leave one of the most brilliant of trotting records behind him. Not only does he hold half a share in the three-year-old championship, but he ranks as the greatest money-winning futurity star in history and is a winner of the trotting turf's two greatest colt classics, the \$65,000 Hambletonian and the \$14,000 Kentucky Futurity. Spencer has the most desirable of blood lines, being a member of the famous Axworthy-Peter the Great family.

Anything Goes As Mittmen Meet in China

SHANGHAI, Oct. 17.—Preparations for possible casualties were made today when the first national Chinese boxing, fencing and wrestling tournament sponsored by the government to encourage these sports opened today with 260 entrants.

In view of the fact that in Chinese boxing, contestants are permitted to kick or hit their opponents in any part of the body and are generally sharp swords and spears are used in fencing, preparations were made to compensate relatives of contestants who may be killed or seriously injured.
