INQUIRY INTO DEATH OF KOENECKE

Chemical Analyst Finds Traces Of Alcohol After Autopsy.

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) ISLINGTON, Ont., Sept. 19.—Professor Joslyn Rogers, chemical analyst of the University of Toronto, told a coroner's inquest tonight inquiring into the death of Leonard Koenecke, Brooklyn baseball player, that there were traces of alcohol in Koenecke's organs, though none in food in the stomach. "If there was any tendency at all for a man to be violent or quarrelsome," Koenecke was in "excellent condition for it to break out."
