THE MARITIME EXHIBIT—At the conference of Maritime Provinces representatives in Toronto last year the president of the Toronto Board of Trade brought up the question of a Maritime building at the Canadian National Exhibition. The matter was discussed by various speakers and the value of such a movement was generally accepted. Premier Baxter, in behalf of the Government of this province, declared that if Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island were agreeable he would pledge this province to pay its share of the cost of such a building. No definite action has since been taken, but it is satisfactory to learn that the three provinces will have exhibits this year so located that they will be together as representative of the Maritimes. The National Exhibition attracts many hundreds of thousands of visitors, and they come from all parts of the continent and from overseas. While there are very many displays, not only Canadian but from all parts of the Empire, a distinctive Maritime Provinces exhibit would prove of great interest and value. It will be the more valuable this year because of the interest that is being manifested by Ontario people in an enlarged import of Maritime products into that province.—St. John-Telegraph Journal.

JUDGEMENT GIVEN In Extradition Case The extradition case of the state of Massachusetts against Major Clark, in which much interest has been displayed, on account of its novel nature in this province, came up before His Honor Judge Inman in the court house at Summerside yesterday for judgement. His Honor's judgement was quite a lengthy document in which he highly complimented counsel on both sides for the manner in which the case had been conducted throughout and upon the exhaustive researches they had made on such short notice. It was, he said, not a question of the guilt or innocence of the accused, as it was only necessary to adduce sufficient evidence to put him on his trial at Cambridge, Mass. His Honor could not consider matters of defence, he considered some of the evidence that was sufficient to put the accused upon his trial and he therefore adjudged the case made out and would make out an order of committal for neglect of the child, his wife not coming under the extradition treaty. In order to give him a chance to apply for habeas corpus, if he so desired, the prisoner would not be surrendered for fifteen days and in the meantime he would remain a prisoner in the Prince County jail. Counsel in the case were Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, of Charlottetown, for the state of Massachusetts, and Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., for the accused.

FARM LABOR SURPLUS IN WEST DISCREDITED REGINA, May 17.—While there have been isolated cases of newly-arrived immigrants refused to take farm jobs, the total, according to government employment officers interviewed today, would be extremely small in comparison with the number of arrivals. Generally speaking, farmers prefer men able to speak English and men with previous experience in western farm work. This fact has given rise to the rumors regarding men refusing farm work. Seeding in all districts, with possibly one or two exceptions, has been uninterrupted and the demand for men has been extremely heavy, making work for all who desire it. It is a fact, however, that many hundreds of men have found employment in Regina. At a conservative estimate 500 houses are under construction in this city.

MOVEMENT OF GOLD AND EXCHANGE RATE DISCUSS. ED BY ROBB

OTTAWA, May 17.—A brief statement with respect to the powers of the Dominion Government to ameliorate exchange rates by the export of gold, was made by Hon. James A. Robb, Minister of Finance, in the House of Commons today. "The Dominion has not Parliamentary authority to deal in the buying and selling of gold for commercial purposes," said Mr. Robb. "If commercial business transacted by the people through the banks requires a

shipment of gold, it becomes the duty of the banks to export or import gold to meet such requirements as their business transactions with the public demand.

IN OWN VAULTS "The banks have gold supplies in their own vaults not under control of the treasury, except such gold as they may from time to time deposit in the Central Gold Reserves toward protecting any surplus issue of their own bank notes over and above the amount allowed them under the provisions of the Bank Act," the Minister informed the House. The banks, he proceeded, were free to export their gold holdings without reference to the Dominion Treasury, together with as much gold as they were able to obtain from the treasury by taking out of circulation and handing back to the treasury Dominion notes previously obtained by them on deposit of gold. Mr. Robb pointed out Canada has large commitments from time to time in New York and London. "When exchange is against Canada to an extent over and above the cost of shipping gold, if our supply of this free gold permits, shipments will take place, but such shipments, being for Government account in New York, and not for sale in New York of Canadian funds, would have no effect on exchange rates other than perhaps what might be designated as a slight sentimental effect."

The Minister had previously explained that the treasury had from time to time brought from Canadian mines gold consigned to the Royal Mint for refining purposes. All such gold has been paid for out of current revenues received from taxation and other Government services. This gold is available for use on Government business only, he stated, and is utilized when required for such purposes.

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Judgement Given In Extradition Case

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PREMIER TABLES PROTOCOL (Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, May 17.—At the adjournment hour in the Commons tonight Premier King tabled the protocol signed at Geneva by which the signatory nations agreed to prohibit the usage of poisonous gas in warfare. The Canadian commons, the Premier announced, is to be asked to approve the protocol, and printed copies are to be distributed to the members in preparation for the debate.
