Hutchinson, in hanging up his fifth triumph and second white-wash job, pounded out two hits himself, one of which figured in the scoring, thus collecting as many safeties as the Yanks were able to garner off his hurling.  
Detroit scored both its runs in the third off Spurgeon (Spud) Chandler who worked the first eight innings and was tagged with his fifth setback.  
Only four Yanks reached base against Hutchinson, who struck out nine.  
Philadelphia Athletics blasted Chicago White Sox 12-0 in an arc-light game in which Phil Marchildon limited the Sox to two hits.  
A cool-weather crowd estimated at 5,000 saw the Mackmen collect 13 hits.  
The A's Canadian right-hander, who lost his last game to St. Louis Browns because of wildness, didn't allow a base on balls and struck out six. It was his fifth win against eight losses.  
Second baseman Don Kolloway singled in the fifth for the first Chicago hit and Whitey Platt singled in the sixth for the second.  
The only other visitor to reach first base was Leo Wells in the eighth when George McQuinn bled a low throw from Pete Suder. Wells was quickly erased when McQuinn and Suder teamed for a double play.  
Washington Senators defeated St. Louis Browns for the third time in a row as Mickey Haefner outpitched Tex Shirley for a 4-2 victory.

**IN THIS CORNER**

Charlottetown tennis officials have been approached by the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association concerning the holding of the Dominion tournament here next year. In soundings about the local club the parent association made it known that at least ten courts would be required to successfully stage such a tournament.  
Staging the Dominion-wide meet would be an ambitious program at any time, and the offer is a compliment to the tennis fraternity here. However, it would call for herculean efforts and it is doubtful, in this stage of tennis comeback locally, that the demands of such a meet could be met. At the present time the Charlottetown Club is enjoying its largest membership in years with 80 to 100 enthusiastic participants, and the work of getting the six courts into first class shape is proceeding apace.  
Five courts are presently in use, but only three are regarded in the best condition. The other three courts require to be re-surfaced, and this fall club officials hope to get the work underway so that they will be in playing shape for next season. By using the Knights of Columbus courts, also at Victoria Park, playing spaces for a Dominion tournament could be provided, but it is unlikely officials will consider the offer in their post-war plans until several build-up tournaments such as the Provincial Closed and Island Open have been held.  
Speaking of tennis the Charlottetown Club plans only a few tournaments this year. However, a contingent of racquet welders will represent the Province in the Nova Scotia open tournament to be held in Truro next week. Among those planning to attend are Bill Bourke, Island and George Case for the past several years and Elton Bourke, ladies singles champion.  
Other players considering attending the meet are Ned Wran, Charlottetown Club secretary, Jim Palmer, Earl Smith, Frank Harland and Ivan Reddin. Messrs. MacMacKinnon and Gus Bennett, who have for years been in the province and who have successfully managed such tournaments as the Eastern Canada championships, have been especially invited to participate as officials.  
The Nova Scotia meet is expected to bring together such well-known Maritime players as Bev Piers, Harry Royer, Garrod Fraser, who has recently returned from overseas where he took part in the Wimbledon tournament, Hugh Lane and Doug and Gordon Baud. There will also be a smattering of players from Quebec and Ontario attending this Maritime event.  
Should the way not be clear to accept the offer of holding the Dominion tournament here in the immediate future it would be a goal to aim at later. Building plans for tournaments, held in post-war days were enthusiastic at the hospitality received and the efficiency with which the meet was handled. Not a little of the success of such tournaments was due to the work and efforts of MacMacKinnon and "Gus" Bentley, neither spared themselves nor the midnight oil.

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**GOLF**

Those of us who have been watching him improve each week didn't have to wait until he tied Lord Mangrum and me at the Coug to see him play seventy-two holes of the National Open Championship to realize that Vic Ghezzi is playing very well these days. Vic, who hails from local N. J., has been an outstanding golfer for more than ten years. His first attracted national attention when he defeated Johnny Revoletta in a playoff in the 1938 Los Angeles Open, but he never played the game better than he is playing it right now.  
I can give first hand testimony of what a tough nut Vic is to crack in any kind of golf competition. Back in 1941 in the PGA Championship at the Cherry Hills Country Club in Denver I had Vic three down in the final round with only nine holes to go. It looked like I was a cinch to win the PGA Championship for the second year in a row, something only a few golfers have done, but he won his next three holes to square the match and then beat me on the 36th hole when I missed a forty-yard putt.  
Ghezzi spent three years in the service, part of the time in the Army more than a year ago and has been a consistent money maker ever since.  
He is a big guy who takes the game seriously and gets plenty of distance off the tee, and he is one of the best putters in the country. He has large hands, lining up his putts and he stills a good percentage of them.  
Ghezzi's putting grip, which he takes more care to get the right grip on his putter than any golfer I know, is a hook which might be an annoyance to anybody else, but he has developed such perfect control of it that he can place his tee shots exactly where he wants them.  
Vic was formerly a teaching professional at the N. J. of his since his discharge from the Army he is devoting all of his time to tournament play. In addition to being on the advisory staff of a sporting goods concern he is also teaching Good Will Golf for Supreme Foods, a Knoxville, Tenn. firm and registers out that way.  
Keep your eye on Ghezzi. He has the golf game to win his share of tournaments. And he won't be playing right now if he turned up as the winner of one or two before we start the winter circuit. This game is getting tougher and tougher every week, and with the Hoggans, the Ghezzi, and the Mangrums playing real sharp golf.
