ARCHBISHOP BRUCHESEI CONDEMNNS FRENCH ACTORS. MONTREAL, Nov. 15.—Theatrical circles were considerably shaken up this morning by a letter read at High Mass in all the Roman Catholic churches from the Archbishop of Montreal, condemning in the severest terms possible, the performances at the Academy of Music, which His Grace designates as a place of peril and danger.

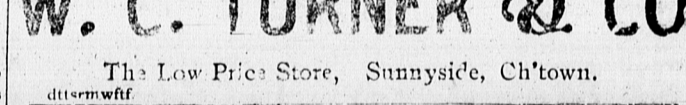
