SAFEGUARD STRAPS

Good Nursing Needed In Transplanting Plants

For making holes to receive seedlings from seed rows or boxes, a dibber is the handiest tool. This is merely a steel or cast iron, rather blunt pointed instrument which you stab into the soil, give a twist, and the hole is ready for the plant. It is much faster than digging each hole with a trowel. The dibber will also be very useful for bulb planting in the fall. You need one in your garden tool kit.

LONG LOOK IN SWEATERS

The longer fitted sweaters is a rival now for the very short one. The new type has been a costly marketing headway in influencing the sweater trend until now the movement is definitely to longer fitted types.

Many of the brief sweaters that last year would have been waist-length are now inching down to cover the hips. You will find them in daytime and evening sweaters, either smoothly molded or with waistline nipped in by ribbing or finer stitches and reinforced here by elastic threads to hold them in. Pullovers with such nipped-in waistlines or with draping at the hips and high necklines slumped at back, as well as the long semi-molded short pullover are especially new-looking.

WHEN REMOVING SEEDLING FROM FLAT AVOID DISTURBING ROOTS BY TAKING PLENTY SOIL WITH IT.
