PINEAPPLE SPONGE Soak 3 tablespoons gelatine in 1/2 cup cold water. Bring 2 cups crushed pineapple to the boiling point, remove from the heat, add the softened gelatine, and cool until mixture has slightly thickened. Add stiffly beaten whites of 3 eggs, and beat with an egg-beater until the mixture is spongy and thick. Pour into a mould, and set in a cold place to harden. Turn out on individual serving dishes, and serve with a border of whipped cream.

Shall a Man Take Revenge on His Faithless Wife?—A Warning From the Grave—Why the Girl Who Settles Down Usually Stays There

Dear Dorothy Dix—I am a married man with three children and the best-looking little wife you ever saw, but she has gone crooked. She admits it and says that she loves this other man. I worship her and have done my best for her, forgiven her, bought her clothes I could not afford, but she just can't keep straight. This is running me mad. What shall I do? Kill her and the man? Get a divorce or what? COWARD.

Answer: Get a divorce. The children's welfare demands that they be removed from under the corrupting influence of such a mother.

An immoral father is bad enough, heaven knows, but he is not the curse to his children that an immoral mother is to hers, because the children are not brought so directly under the father's influence as they are under the mother's. A good mother may nullify the influence of a bad father, but no father can atone to his children for having a bad mother.

Also a man's immoralities are not often staged under his children's eyes. Likewise, it reflects far more on children for them to have a bad mother than to have a bad father. So far these and many other reasons children should be taken from the custody of a mother who will teach them low ideals of conduct and who will almost certainly lead her daughters to follow her example.

It is perhaps because women of this kind, who have an attraction for other men, have a double attraction for their husbands, that they are so often loved far above their worth and much more than better women.

And it is this baffled love and jealousy, as well as the insult to his honor, that makes many a betrayed husband slay those who have wrecked his home. But for all desperate remedies for a desperate situation, this is the most senseless. It brings back to the man none of the happiness of which he has been robbed, but it brings utter ruin down on himself and his children.

The hands that have been stained with blood can never be washed clean again. It wrecks a man in mind, in body and purse to go through the awful ordeal of a murder trial, even when sentiment and pity acquit him on what we call "the unwritten law." And that is a high price to pay for revenge.

Believe me, poor, unhappy husband, a worthless woman is not worth the sacrifice of the remainder of your life and your children's future. Let her go. A good riddance of bad rubbish. Have done with her. Put her and her lover out of your mind, out of your soul and build your life again along other lines. The real reason for divorce, the justification for divorce, is to save just such men as you from committing murder. DOROTHY DIX.

Certainly it could add nothing to the bliss of an angel in Heaven to keep the husband that she had left on earth lonely and uncared for, loveless and homeless. And if by chance the lady's present address is not Heaven, but the other place, believe me, she is far too much occupied in trying to keep cool to bother about whether her late husband is taking to himself another wife or not.

And, in any case, it has never been established that the dead have any way of wigwagging messages to us in our sleep. So tell your fiance that he will have to come across with a better reason than that for getting out of his engagement.

Of course, however, your sweetheart's first wife can be a menace to your happiness and she will come between you and him, if he is one of the blundering idiots who never understands that a second wife is always more or less jealous of her predecessor and if he always keeps throwing her in her teeth, so to speak. For there are men who are always telling wife No. 2 what a wonder wife No. 1 was, what a marvelous cook she was, how she could run a house without money and make an omelet without breaking eggs.

Milady Beautiful

EXERCISES FOR THE AVERAGE WOMAN

Without regular exercise a woman can seldom enjoy really good health. This is especially true of women above the age of 35 to 40. At this age the tendency to put on flesh is very common, while at the same time the muscles become flabby. Perhaps one-half of the women who complain of weakness and lack of pep are weak from want to systematic exercise; there is nothing constitutionally wrong. Such women find it wearying to stand erect, a short walk tires them, backache becomes troublesome and, in addition, they often suffer from headache and low, depressed spirits.

Then, too, there are other evils arising from lack of exercise. The digestion is weakened, constipation comes on and the system is more or less poisoned by absorption of waste



This condition produces mud-diness of the skin and is the most common cause of a poor complexion.

The good effects of these systematic movements that I shall describe for you today are that they increase the capacity of the lungs and stimulate the flow of blood throughout the whole body. In consequence, all the organs of the body become more active, the blood is purer, the perspiration is freer and the skin is healthier. Women above the age of 30 who have not yet acquired the habit of daily exercise have no idea of the great benefits that they are denying themselves. It pays big dividends in health and beauty to spend ten or fifteen minutes a day in scientific training of the muscles.

Exercise 1. Stand erect with hands raised straight above the head and the thumbs linked together. Inhale deeply and then bend the body forward from the hips, bringing the fingers as near the floor as possible. The knees must not be bent. Then return to the first position, slowly lower the arms to the sides and at the same time exhale. Repeat five or ten times at first, with intervals of ten or fifteen seconds, until your muscles are limbered and then increase the number of repetitions, touching the floor with the palms of the hands.

Exercise 2. Stand erect with hands on hips. Inhale and bend the body forward from the waist. Keeping the hands on the hips, slowly twist the body forward, backward and from left to right in a circle. Repeat five to ten times.

Exercise 3. Stand with feet together. Extend the right arm in front of the body and the left arm behind, both being level with the shoulders. Then swing the body round until the left arm points forward and the right arm backward. Repeat five to ten times. This exercise expands the chest and strengthens the abdominal muscles.

Exercise 4. Stand with the feet about two inches apart. Raise the arms above the head. Then bend the body from the waist to each side alternately. This exercise strengthens the muscles of the side and back and
