THE Maritime Province C. Edeavor Convention will be held in Sackville, on Sept. 5, 6 and 7. The session will be held in the Methodist church. The societies are composed of the Presbyterian, Congregational, Methodist, Baptist and Church of England bodies. There are in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island 675 societies, the majority of which are in Nova Scotia. There will be probably about 250 delegates present.—Truro Sun.

WAS IT A SEA SERPENT? While the steamer Alameda was making her regular trip up East River and while passing McNally's Island a large object, which was supposed to be a large fish was seen floating near the shore. As the steamer drew near, the object became frightened and commenced to direct its energy toward the beach and finally landed and ran into the woods. The blowing of the steamer's whistle brought a number of the natives of the Island down to the beach but it is said that they became frightened as soon as they saw the steamer and fled.

ALL the cheese offered on the Brockville, Ont., board on Thursday sold at 12c. August creamery butter sold in Montreal this week at 22 to 22 1/2c., and one lot of fancy brought 23c. The English market is taking considerable dairy butter, which has advanced there 8 to 10 shillings per cwt. From 15 1/2 to 16 1/2 has lately been paid in Ontario for dairy butter for export. The plum crop is a failure in New Brunswick, very poor in Nova Scotia and light in Ontario, about a half crop in P. E. I. Prices have advanced 10c. per basket in Ontario. New Brunswick apples are selling on this market at \$1 to \$2.25 per barrel, according to quality. Most of them would sell better if they were more carefully picked.

AMONG the travellers at the I. C. R. depot last evening was Mr. John R. Mackenzie, on his way back to Massachusetts. He had been home attending his father's funeral at New Glasgow. Mr. Mackenzie, who has worked industriously in the States for over twenty years as a carpenter, has apparently done well, and within a short time has bought a good farm on P. E. I., near the birth-place of his wife, on to which he will move next year.—We mention these incidents not to bring this good man prominently before the public, as possibly he may not thank us for so doing, but rather to impress on others the idea of following his example, as there are farms in many parts of these provinces which energetic men would do well to settle, more especially as at the present time there appears to be a rising tide of prosperity setting in around us that must eventually work well for our farmers.—Truro News.

A PECULIAR case of horse stealing is reported from Bedeque. It appears that Mr. Silas Farrow was in the habit of keeping one of his horses, a family pet, in his front yard during the night. Last Friday morning, however, the front gate was open, and no horse was to be found. Mr. Farrow, never suspecting theft, did not trouble his head very much about the matter at first, but after having made several unsuccessful inquiries among his neighbors, concluded that the horse had been stolen. On Saturday he went to Summerside, and after making several inquiries at last learned that a horse favoring his description had been seen in that town the evening before, and that he was probably to be found there still. Following certain directions given, he arrived at the suspected place and found the proprietor absent. Whilst waiting for his man, he had the satisfaction of seeing his own horse hitched in another man's wagon drive up, and soon learned that this man had bought the horse the evening before from a man who told him that he had been working at the sewerage work in Charlottetown and being discharged had bought the horse for a nominal sum, or words to that effect. The thief's name however is known and it is alleged had been engaged by a Bedeque farmer, and it is further alleged that he had suddenly left Thursday night taking Mr. Farrow's horse with him. Certainly such persons should be made examples of, and not allowed to roam at large endangering the property of law-abiding citizens.
