Miss Alice M. Hodgson, who retired on January 1st from the Malden Hospital where she had served many years as matron, was pleasantly surprised and presented with a silver loving cup in Louise hall Saturday evening at the monthly meeting of the Malden Medical Society. Dr. C. E. Prior made the presentation speech and Miss Hodgson was completely overcome with surprise but fittingly responded. Miss Hodgson had been invited to attend a farewell meeting of the hospital staff. The cup is gold lined and inscribed "To Alice M. Hodgson in appreciation of years of faithful service from the Malden Hospital Staff." Dr. C. D. McCarthy started the project and it was taken up by Dr. Prior and others. The retirement of Miss Hodgson is generally regretted, not only by the physicians and hospital attaches but the members of the corporation and the others who have had dealings with the institution. Her successor, Mrs. Leonia Lowery of New Bedford assumed charge today. Miss Hodgson will continue to reside here. At the Medical Society meeting which followed the presentation, Prof. Arnold of Tufts College gave an address on "Dietetics." Dr. P. J. Plummer, president, presided. The above is copied from the "Malden Evening News" of Feb. 15th. The young lady referred to is a daughter of William Hodgson of Malpeque and has many friends and acquaintances in this City and Province who will be pleased to learn of the high appreciation in which she is held by the Malden Hospital Staff. On New Year's day Mr. Brine passed through Truro with the remains of his wife, who had died suddenly while on a visit to her son, Percy Brine in Brookline, Mass.

Mr. Brine leaves a family of four; besides a brother, R. F. Brine, Truro; and three sisters, Mrs. D. Rogers, of Charlottetown, Mrs. Taylor, Casco, and Mrs. Moore, wife of the late Rev. D. A. Moore, a former rector at St. Marton--Truro News.

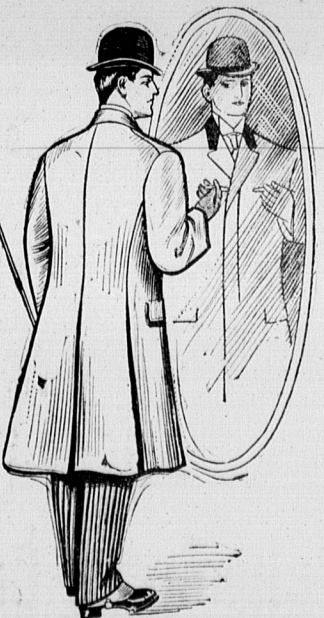
