LONDON, February 15.—The situation is regarded as menacing that all Europeans in Madras, British India, are being enrolled as special constables by order of the Government, according to a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Madras dated Monday. The dispatch adds that it is understood that constables will be armed with pistols after an examination.

New Hampshire Operatives to Continue Fight

BOSTON, Feb. 15.—The second day of the strike operated in cotton mills in New Hampshire, textile centres and in Lowell, Mass., passed without either disorder or major inflection of a move toward settlement. The fact that the workers in New Hampshire were as much disturbed by the increase of six hours in their working week as by the wage reduction averaging twenty per cent which went into effect in many New England mills this week, was indicated in a statement by a union leader at Manchester tonight.

Canada May Accept Australia's Offer of Preferential Trade

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—As a result of the conference here in the past two days between R. H. Hooper, premier, representing the Australian Government, and Premier King and Messrs. Fielding, Kobb and Bureau of the Dominion Government, a preferential arrangement between Canada and the Commonwealth is likely to be concluded within a few months. The Australian parliament assembled at the same time as the Canadian House. In the new tariff of that country there is an general provision authorizing a preference extended to sister dominions and this is considered to be applied.

Navy Onslaught Geddes Report Causing a Stir

LONDON, Feb. 15.—An authoritative statement was made by an official of the Admiralty to a Reuters correspondent in answer to an enquiry in reference to the Admiralty's memorandum on the Geddes economy committee's report, which criticized Admiralty expenditure. This official said: "In taking such steps as seem to be advisable to reduce the serious and misleading reflections on the Admiralty in the Geddes report, Col. L. C. Amery, Parliamentary Secretary to the Board of Admiralty, was in no sense exceeding his authority. The memorandum contains the considered views of the Admiralty, and they have nothing to add to it."

Plans For Opening Of World Tribunal

THE HAGUE, Feb. 15.—Plans are taking shape for the opening in the Peace Palace next Wednesday of the permanent Court of International Justice created by the League of Nations. Robed members will make solemn entrance into the great hall of justice; directors of the Carnegie Foundation are to escort to their seats Queen Wilhelmina, Queen Mother Emma and Prince Constantine. The Registrar will then read the oath which all judges shall repeat in the order of precedence. Speeches are to be made by Foreign Minister Van Karnebeek, representing "The Netherlands" Government, The Hague Burgomaster speaking for the municipality.

Emma Goldman Faces A Nasty Situation

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 15.—Sweden is facing a curious dilemma as the result of her well-meaning hospitality in granting temporary asylum to Emma Goldman, Alexander Berkman, and Alexander Shapiro, deported to Russia from the United States. Since their arrival, several other Russian anarchists have come into the country. As matters stand at present Sweden may either have to deport the anarchists or cope with an increasing number of them. It is not known whether the Swedish government will do this or whether the anarchists will be allowed to remain in the country.
