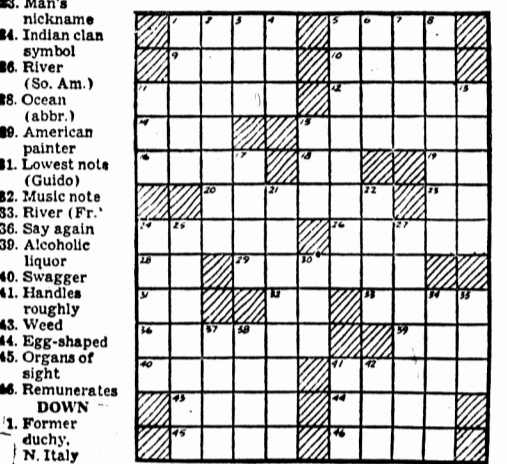

price of shortening, cotton seed and soy beans oils, it is quite evident that when they are dressed up to look and smell like butter, the price of margarine will not be low, probably 50c or more.

We must also realize that with an annual increase of 20,000,000 in the world's population and already less land in cultivation than will adequately feed the present population, the farmers skill is going to be taxed more and more to feed the world. That the shortage in fats is one of the most serious food problems makes it most undesirable that Canadians, now among the world's best-fed people, take a step which will aggravate the fat shortage or put land out of cultivation.

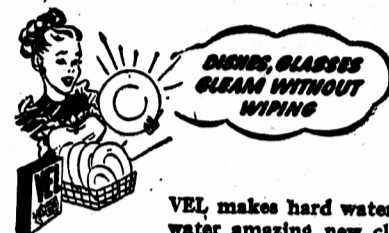
