MR. WYLLIE JARDINE

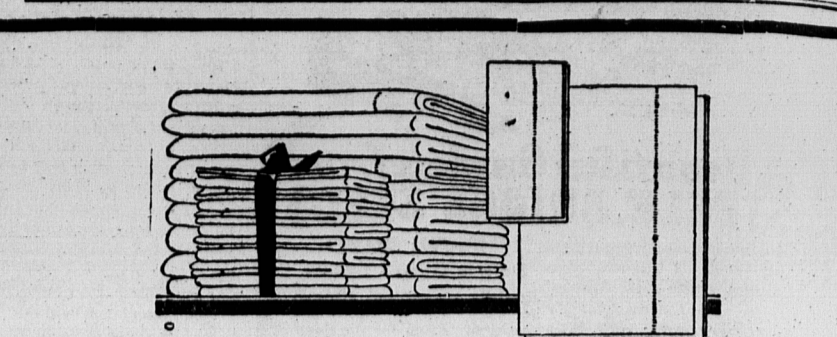
