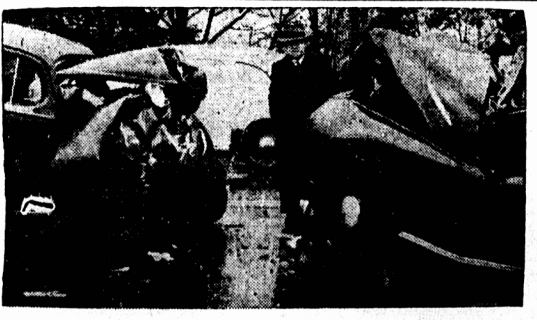

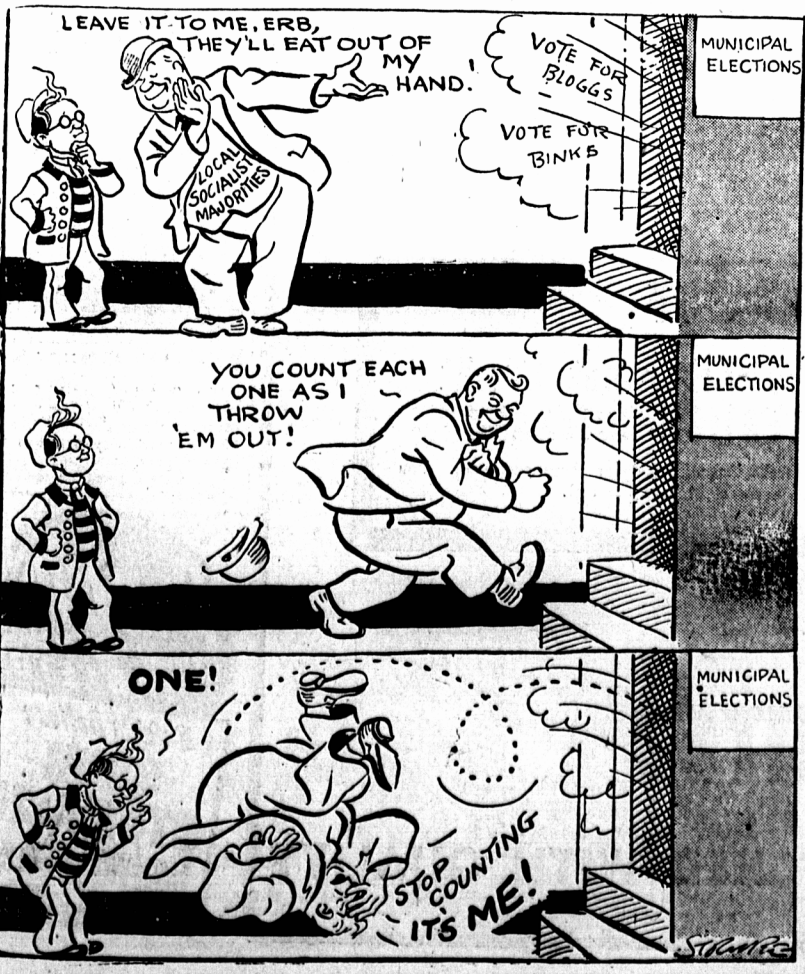

VICTORIA THE VILLAGE BY THE SEA

A grey sky with the sun gleaming through at times added solemnity to the service held at Victoria Hall on Remembrance Day November 11th, 1947, and with the flag floating proudly in a gentle breeze greeted all who had assembled at the Memorial Tablet to do honour to our fallen heroes and those who had safely returned from the conflicts of World War I and II. The opening number on the programme was the singing of O Canada by the school children followed by prayer by Rev. Russell Woodside of Tryon United Church, and the placing of wreaths on the tablet, one by little Sylvia Boulter from the school, one by Mrs. L. D. MacLeod in honour of her nephew, Murchison Gordon who was lost at sea and one by Mr. Keith Boswell from the Legion.

A full two minutes silence was then observed very reverently as all stood with bowed heads in honour of the noble lads who fought so gallantly and died that we might enjoy the freedom and the peace that now is ours. The next part of the morning's programme took place inside the hall, members of the local branch of the Canadian Legion marching in a body under command of Mr. Eddie Morrison, one of the members, Mr. Keith Boswell, a veteran of World War I, who very capably acted as chairman and seated on the platform with him was the Rev. T. Head, pastor of the Hampton United Church, Rev. B. Fream, rector of the Anglican Church, Crapaud, Rev. C. Hicks, pastor of the Tryon, Bonshaw Baptist Pastorate and Rev. R. Woodside, pastor of the Tryon United Church. Mr. Boswell in a few nicely worded opening remarks called on Mr. Head, Rev. Mr. Fream and Rev. Mr. Hicks, who each in turn gave very appropriate and pleasing addresses and lastly upon Rev. Mr. Woodside who gave a lengthy but equally well pleasing and interesting discourse, himself being a veteran of World War II he could speak from a wider experience. Their addresses were interspersed with the singing of several beautiful National Hymns including the impressive "Let Us Forget." There was also a lovely reading and prayer by Miss Freda Bowatt, a recitation in Flanders Fields, nicely given by Miss Janet Howatt. The beautiful number, "Some-time We'll Understand as a Trio by the Misses Maylea and Ruthie Boswell and Mr. David Boswell, pleasingly rendered and the closing prayer by Rev. Mr. Woodside. The benediction by Rev. Mr. Head and the singing of God Save the King brought to a close a service to be proudly cherished in loving remembrance of our gallant men.

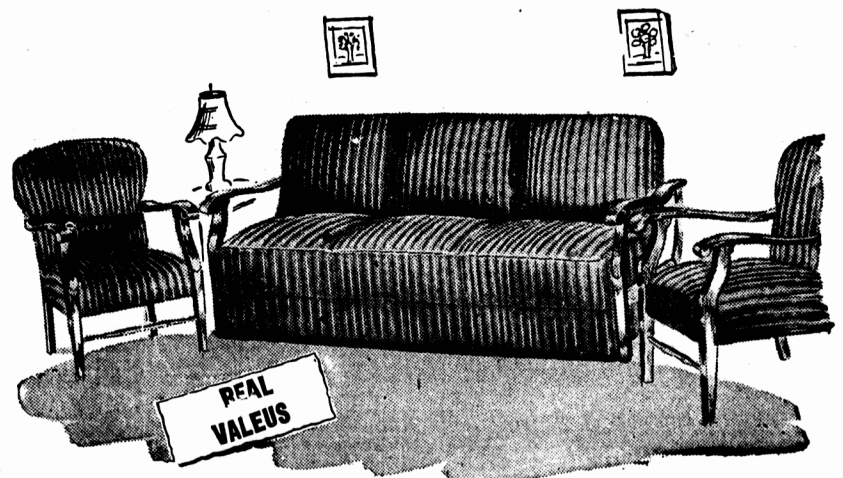
