protected; cans, if any, burned and
pounded flat.

Dining Shelter.—Table, dishes,
cutlery, food boxes, etc.
Gadgets.—Miscellaneous useful con-
veniences. These may be considered
one day for ingenuity, another for
practical usefulness, and another for
safety, or dangerous features.
Latrines.—Being properly used,
clean, free of flies; well screened
from view.

The table of inspection points to
be awarded should worked out by
the Camp Court of Honour.

Roll call found seven centres rep-

regretted and a loving message ac-
companied with flowers was sent her.
Mrs. Boothroyd announced that the
provincial convention would be held
