SCHOOL PARTIES EXCHANGE TRIPS

LONDON, Dec. 1.—(CP)—Plans for school children's "goodwill" ships to visit Canada and the United States in 1940 are being promoted by H. W. Barter, London schoolmaster and secretary of the association, who left for America in November for this purpose. Mr. Barter will arrange for the reception of young Britons in America and for the visit of young Americans to Britain. He hopes to talk to both Lord Tweedsmuir and President Roosevelt about his scheme.

The School Journey Association, founded 25 years ago, is a voluntary association of teachers who arrange educational visits for school children to various parts of Britain and abroad. The children are drawn almost entirely from elementary and secondary schools. Almost 70,000 children now take part annually in school journeys and last summer more than 15,000 went on trips abroad.

LACK OF WORK BOOSTS CRIME

DETROIT, Dec. 1.—(CP)—Police Supt. P. W. Frahm blamed disturbances and unemployment for a nine per cent increase in minor crime here this year. Frahm said criminals have taken advantage of transfer of police from regular duty to strike duty and unemployment has provided the incentive for increased stealing.

Christmas Sailing For Overseas

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 2.—In keeping with the greater development of travel these days, many people are planning to spend Christmas in the British Isles on the Continent, and on the termination of the pre-Christmas sailings from Montreal these will be followed by eight sailings from Halifax this month for Great Britain and Europe, according to C. W. Johnston, General Passenger Traffic Manager of the Canadian National Railways.

These sailings will be the "Montclair" on December 3, the "Alania" December 4, the "samaria" December 5, the "Duchess of York" December 10, the "Aurania" December 11, "Athena" December 13, the "Duchess of Richmond" December 14 and the "Duchess of Athol" December 18.

Other sailings will take place from Halifax for Scandinavian and other countries. There will be two sailings from Halifax of the Gdynia-American Line, the steamers "Pilsudski" November 30 for Copenhagen and Gdynia, and the "Batory" December 13 for Copenhagen, Helsingfors and Gdynia. The Swedish-American Line will have sailings from Halifax on December 2 and December 9 for Gothenburg. In addition to above, various lines will have sailings from United States ports.

In order to take care of the extra volume of passenger traffic by rail for these pre-Christmas sailings, additional train services will be in operation by the Canadian National Railways, which will include special through sleeping cars from Western Canada, connecting up with trains from the East for conveyance of passengers to the ships' side at Halifax.

A considerable volume of pre-Christmas passenger traffic has already been reported to now, and it is expected that the sailings yet to take place from Halifax will be heavily patronized," stated Mr. Johnston, "the special train services of the Canadian National Railways greatly facilitating this overland movement."

Royal Visit To Canada

Canadian interest of the royal visit is everywhere apparent, according to "Canada's Weekly." Every Province of the Dominion is, of course, anxious to be included in the tour, and many cities and towns urge that Their Majesties should come to them even if they are off the customary route. No Province will be overlooked, but if the visit is confined to the suggested three weeks, with about half the time spent in travelling, the stay in particular places will be cut short and only large centres can be visited.

Toronto is highly exercised over the place of the royal residence when in the city. Government House—the beautiful residence of former Lieutenant-Governors—has been discarded because of economy plans of the Ontario Government. Many beautiful private homes would gladly be placed at the disposal of the visitors, but the necessity of choosing a particular one would be an invidious task. The beautiful Hotel Canadian Pacific's splendid hostelry, the Hotel York, might be taken over. Various suggestions will be considered.

A NEW CANADIAN STAMP

A new 13-cent postage stamp, depicting the entrance to Halifax harbour will be issued on November 15 by the Canadian Post Office, says "Canada's Weekly." It will be double-sized and horizontally arranged, and its colour will be ultramarine. It was originally intended to issue the new stamp, completing the current King George VI issue on June 15 last, when other issues of the series were issued, but it was delayed on account of difficulty experienced in fitting in a suitable design with the general plan followed in the new issue.

OFFICIALS STUDY ACCESS HIGHWAYS

LANSING, Mich., Dec. 1.—(CP)—Michigan highway officials are studying limited access highways as a possible solution to traffic-congested streets in Detroit and other large urban centres. Col. S. M. Waldron, Rapid Transit Commissioner, predicted the plan to state officials after studying highway traffic plans in other states.

These depressed roadways are designed for fast distance travel, so they limit the number of places at which it is possible for vehicles to enter or leave and deny to the abutting property all rights of direct entrance or exit.

The roads fall into two classes, the first of which can be used only by private passenger car, and the
