### MARKET REVIEW

Little definite improvement in the Canadian business situation was noted during the past week. The relative inactivity of the stock market was regarded as reflecting the disappointment occasioned by the failure of business to show definite upward trend so far in the second quarter. The general opinion now held is that there would be improvement in the fall. An encouraging feature has been the fair volume of export wheat sales from the North American continent.

### COPPER SITUATION

Canadians are materially interested in the copper price situation

In view of the fact that copper forms either the major or an important product of such leading companies as International Nickel and Noranda Mines. The demand for export during the past week has perhaps surpassed expectations. There is no doubt that a new high monthly record will have been established in May. Fears of further price reductions, however, have not yet been fully allayed.

### INTERNATIONAL NICKEL

Probably the most interesting item in the record of exports of minerals from Canada during the month of April, is one which reads "platinum in concentrates or other forms, \$90,000." Side by side with this item is another giving the total for March, 1930, as \$3,600. Below this is a notation indicating a blank record for April of last year. The record is highly significant. It means that during the past month, for the first time in its history, International Nickel Company enjoyed to a substantial extent the benefit from the rich stores of platinum lodged in the Frood ore. The March exports were almost negligible; April's total, if continued month by month, would represent over \$1,000,000 for the entire year. This precious metal is of course what might be termed a by-product with nickel and copper as the chief metals. Naturally the output must be gauged by market demand. A much larger use of platinum, however, is forecast.

### CANADA CAR

Reports from Canadian Car & Foundry Company indicate that the volume of business enjoyed so far this year, inclusive of the carry-over from last year amounts to about \$27,000,000. It is quite true that the new business received since the beginning of the present fiscal year has been less than for the previous year as car orders from the railways are not up to the record larger carry-over, however, than was the case one year ago, and a very substantial and steady business has come in this year from sources other than railway cars, such as street cars, dump cars, etc., and foundry business from large number of plants. The company is assured of a substantial percentage of operations to the end of its fiscal year. The stock, selling around 23 provides a return of well over 7% with prospects of dividend being earned by a very wide margin.

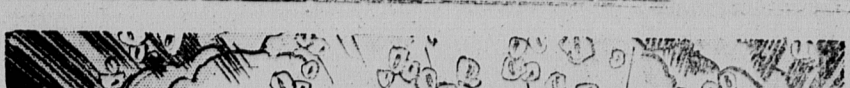
Miss Stella French has returned home after visiting in Riverdale with her sister Mrs. John N. MacFadyen.

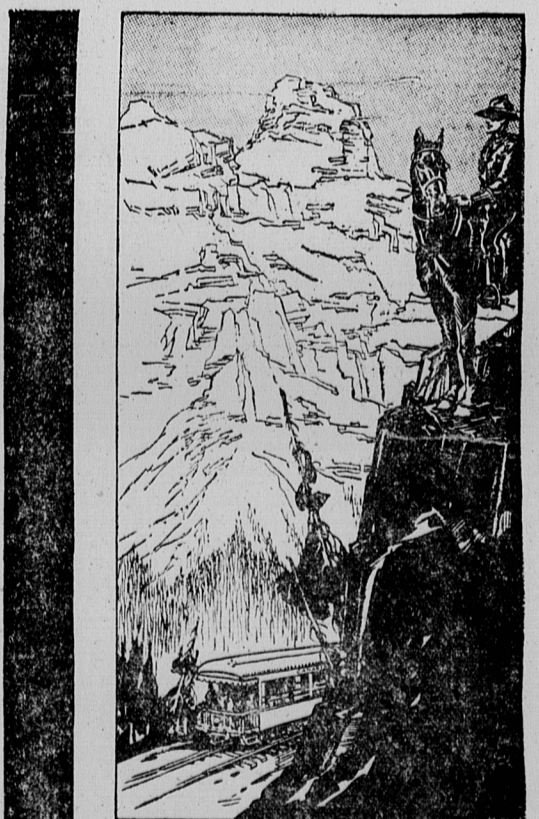
