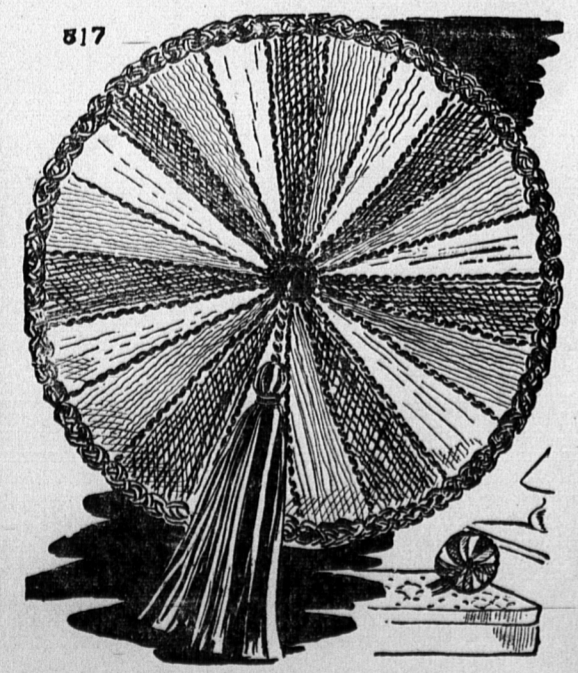

THE COOK'S CORNER

OYSTER STEW

1 tablespoon minced parsley 1-2 cup diced celery 1-4 cup sliced onion 2 cups hot water 4 cups milk Oysters Oyster liquor Butter Method: Place parsley, celery and onion in a saucepan and add the hot water. Cook until the vegetables are tender, then strain. Add the milk to the strained liquid. You will allow from 4 to 6 oysters per serving. The liquor should be drained from them and strained thoroughly. Add the oyster liquor and the oysters to the milk mixture and heat slowly until the oysters curl at the edges. Season to taste with salt and paprika. Place a small piece of butter in the bottom of each serving dish and fill with the hot stew. Here is a simple and savory method for preparing oysters.

SAVORY OYSTERS

You will need about one dozen large oysters for this, along with two strips of bacon, bread crumbs and catsup. Drain and dry oysters, dip in tomato catsup and then in crumbs. Place in a shallow greased baking dish. Sprinkle finely diced bacon over the top and bake in a very hot oven until browned, about 6 minutes. Serve with lemon. Fried oysters are always a favorite, here, however, they are breaded before being fried.

BREADED OYSTERS

Oysters: 1 cup bread crumbs 1-2 teaspoon salt Pepper 2 eggs 1 tablespoon water Method: Drain the oysters and dry them. Dip in the crumbs to which the salt and a dash of pepper have been added. Beat the eggs slightly with the water and dip the oysters in this mixture and then in the seasoned crumbs again. Fry in deep fat heated to 385 deg. F. or hot enough to brown a day-old cube of bread in 50 seconds. When golden brown, remove from fat and drain on unglazed paper. Serve with lemon or the following sauce.

WHITE FRUIT CAKE

1-2 cup shortening 1-1-3 cups sugar 3 cups cake flour 1-2 teaspoon salt 4 teaspoon baking powder 5 egg whites 1 cup water 1-2 teaspoon orange or almond extract 1-2 cup candied cherries, sliced 1-2 cup candied pineapple, cut up 1 teaspoon candied orange peel 1-2 teaspoon vanilla extract Method: Cream shortening, add sugar slowly and keep creaming until light in color. Sift flour salt and baking powder, and add alternately with mixed liquids. When well mixed, add slightly floured fruits; lastly fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn mixture into paper-lined pan and bake for 50 minutes in moderate oven (350 F.).

Drastic measures are best, too, for hair that is faded, dry and split at the ends. Snip them off, then comb your hair to more lustrous beauty by extra brushing and by working a good pomade or cream brilliantine into the end all over your head. If you are letting dyed hair grow out, you'll save yourself embarrassment if you have it cut quite short and wear it beautifully groomed so the two tones are not noticeable.

Before applying mascara, be sure the brush is thoroughly clean with dry, clean water. Remove all traces of old mascara clogging the bristles to cause them to stick out at odd angles. Rinse the brush thoroughly after use, so that it will always be ready for the next application. Remember to tilt your head back and use just enough color to cover the lashes neatly all the way to their tips. This makes it easier to reach the hairs without touching the skin or getting mascara in the eyes.

SMART INSIGNIA FOR WOMEN'S ARMY Smartly uniformed soldiers of the Canadian Women's Army Corps are soon to have badges and insignia of rank as smart as any regiment of the Canadian Army. Volunteers of the Corps will wear the C.W.A.C. badge on the brown epaulettes, reproduced above in actual size, and officers will surmount by insignia of their rank. Shown on the epaulette is the insignia of a Chief Commander, the equivalent of Lieut.-Colonel. Maple leaves take the place of "pips" and the beaver is worn where a crown would mark similar rank in the Army. "op right" is the cap badge, (all ranks), three maple leaves in white metal super-imposed on gilt or brass lozenge. Centre, the helmeted head of "Athens" forms the design for the buttons of the uniform. Bottom, the collar badge combines the head of "Athens" and a scroll suspended by maple leaves, and bearing the letters, "C.W.A.C."
