DELEGATES ARRIVE FOR BIG CONVENTION

Opening Session Of Canadian Good Roads Association Conference Will Be Held This Morning In Provincial Building.

The sixteenth annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association, which opens this morning at Charlottetown, is expected to prove one of the most interesting and important gatherings in the history of the organization. It marks the realization of the association's set policy of rotating its annual gatherings until each of the provinces has been visited, Prince Edward Island being the last of the nine to act as host to the convention. Last week an "advance guard," including Mr. S. L. Equire, chairman of the executive committee, George A. McNamee, secretary-treasurer and J. A. McNeill, managing editor of the Montreal Gazette, arrived in the city, spending the intervening time in perfecting arrangements and conferring with local committees here. Vice-Regal Party Leave Toronto

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 16.—His Excellency Viscount Willingdon, Lady Willingdon and party left Toronto Saturday night for Ottawa and it is understood that for some time His Excellency will not accept public engagements. Coming to Toronto for the purpose of attending the ceremonies in connection with the centenary at Upper Canada College, His Excellency felt indisposed and did not attend any of the functions on Friday, Saturday morning, feeling a little better, he decided to keep a golf engagement at Rosedale, but was seized with a fainting spell on the course, and arrangements were made for his return to Ottawa, following the advice of physicians that rest was imperative.

The party left North Toronto station at 11 p. m. Because of the seizure His Excellency was compelled to cancel several engagements, including the Upper Canada garden party on Saturday afternoon and the centenary ball in the evening. He planned to return with Hon. Vincent Massey and Mrs. Massey to Batterwood House, their summer place, near Port Hope. The vice regal party also planned to spend Monday in Oshawa, but word was sent to Mayor T. B. Mitchell that the visit would have to be postponed sine die. Reports from Ottawa were that he soon would be better.

The association holds an annual convention for the purpose of discussing current problems connected with the construction and maintenance and regulations governing the use of the highways. The lectures are both technical and in the language of the layman. The printed proceedings of these conventions, which are distributed throughout the country, are accepted as valuable textbooks on road-building.

The bringing together of government officials, engineers, contractors, county councillors, municipal men and representatives of boards of trade, good roads and automobile organizations is not only a great asset to the cause, but in addition these meetings, as has been stated by many of the delegates, do much to unite the various sections of Canada through the hospitable and fraternal spirit which is always expressed. The knowledge and ideas gained at these meetings put into dollars and cents means considerable to those attending.

The association, which fathered the federal aid bill which appropriated \$20,000,000 to aid the provinces in highway construction, was successful on two occasions in extending the time limit for those provinces which were unable to use their allotments during the time prescribed, and this activity has been of especial benefit to the western provinces. The association is still carrying on with a view to obtaining further aid for the provinces. A large proportion of this association's energy and resources has been devoted towards federal aid.

The association carries on a publicity campaign through the daily newspapers and the technical journals, and the clipping books during the last several years disclose many thousands of dollars worth of free publicity, creating public opinion in favor of the objects of this association.

The association, through affiliation and otherwise, is in contact with the leading good roads organizations throughout the world, and the executive is thereby enabled to dispense the latest modes of construction and modern ideas dealing with road work.

The association carries on a daily correspondence with its members

MacDonald To Visit Canada

LONDON, Sept. 16.—From an authoritative source the Canadian Press today learned that Premier Ramsey MacDonald after his visit to Washington will reach Niagara Falls, Ont., on October 14, proceeding to Toronto the next day if possible. Premier Macdonald will meet the British Prime Minister at Toronto on October 15. On October 16, Mr. Macdonald will proceed to Ottawa, where he will remain perhaps three days to discuss many matters with the Canadian Prime Minister. The British Premier will then enjoy a few days' rest before sailing for Great Britain on the Duchess of York, leaving Quebec City on October 25.

World's Largest Yacht Under Construction

BATH, Me., Sept. 16.—In a shipyard on the Kennebec River, the world's largest and most expensive pleasure craft is under construction for J. Pierpont Morgan, New York millionaire. Work on it is being rushed so that it may be launched early next spring. Costing approximately \$2,000,000, the craft, when completed, will be 343 feet long from stem to stern—more than 33 feet longer than any present pleasure boat. A crew of over 100 will be needed to sail the yacht, which will be christened The

DEMAND SELF-GOVERNMENT

GRENADA, B. W. I., Sept. 16.—Characterizing the present system of crown colony government as unsatisfactory and petitioning for the immediate grant of self-government a resolution was unanimously carried by five thousand residents of Grenada who gathered at Queen's Park to hear the opening address of Captain the Hon. A. A. Cipriani, member of the legislative council of Trinidad, who launched the campaign for West Indian federation and self government. Mr. Cipriani, who is deputy mayor of the Trinidad Working Men's Association, affiliated with the British labor party, spoke of labor conditions in the West Indies, and voiced the belief that self-government would be granted if the demand were made unanimously or backed by a substantial majority.

FOUR MISSING

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. Y., Sept. 16.—Fifteen persons were hurt, one probably fatally, in a series of explosions and fires originating in a sewer on Water street, between Main and Second streets here today. Two men and two women employees were missing an hour after the blast and firemen were searching the ruins of the building in the belief that they had been burned in the wreckage.

Election Report Not Confirmed

FREDERICTON, N. B., September 16.—The Daily Gleaner today says: It is reported today from sources generally well informed in regard to matters affecting New Brunswick provincial politics that a general election has been booked for Monday, October 28. That date is six weeks from today and would amply permit of the required official notice being given. There is no confirmation of this report from official sources. Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Premier of New Brunswick when asked today about a report from Fredericton that the provincial elections were to be held on October 28, refused to deny or confirm the report. In due time he said the people would find out whether the report was correct or not.

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Outbreak Near Sea Of Galilee

JERUSALEM, Sept. 16.—News of a new outbreak at Hattin, near the Sea of Galilee, in which raiding Bedouin tribesmen lost 16 dead and many wounded before being dispersed again disturbed the peaceful atmosphere of Palestine, where no trouble between Jews and Arabs had been reported for a week. Reports to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency state there is a growing feeling among the Egyptian Arabs that the grand mufti of Jerusalem, recognized Moslem leader, is partly responsible for the recent troubles in the country. Dissatisfaction with the grand mufti is said to be partly due to his alleged failure to fully account for funds raised in Egypt for repairing the Mosque of Omar.

HEALTH IS REASSURING

LONDON, Sept. 16.—The King is fighting his way back to health on a literary diet of detective yarns and thrilling mystery stories. The Daily News today reported the health of the British monarch is extraordinarily reassuring after his long illness last winter. At Sandringham, the royal country estate in Norfolk, there are none of the usual house parties and there isn't any indication he will be permitted to engage in his favorite pastime of shooting as his physicians feel he must prepare to spend the coming and future winters quietly and carefully.

CANADIAN COINAGE IN FOUNDATION STONE

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 16.—A specimen of Canadian coinage will likely be buried with the foundation stone of the new League of Nations building, which is to be laid during the session of the Assembly in Geneva this month. A copy of a circular communication, asking that all state members of the League bring with them to the assembly specimens of their national coinage for this purpose, has been received by the Dominion government.

STATEMENT ON DISARMAMENT IN ONTARIO THIS FALL

LONDON, Sept. 16. (Canadian Press Staff Correspondent).—An authoritative statement of the position regarding the naval disarmament negotiations was given to the Canadian Press today by a source in intimate touch with the prime minister, as follows: A total cruiser strength of 50 is desired for Great Britain. The cruisers however are divided into two categories, namely, 8 inch gun and 6 inch gun cruisers. Britain maintains her requirements compel her to divide her fifty cruisers into fifteen 8 inch and thirty five 6 inch cruisers, making a total tonnage of 339,000. The United States proposal is for twenty-one 8 inch and fifteen 6 inch cruisers. The United States total tonnage claim is 315,000. The disputed margin at present between the two countries is three 8 inch cruisers and a tonnage of 15,000 as Britain suggests that the United States total tonnage should be 300,000.

This statement is generally in line with the expressed requirements of the two powers, policing cruisers for Great Britain and fewer but more powerful cruisers for the United States.

HISTORICAL DOCUMENTS OF H. M. S. VICTORY

LONDON, Sept. 16.—(By The Canadian Press)—Sir Leicester Harcourt, who a few years back made a gift to Canada of valuable manuscripts, in memory of his brother, Lord Northcliffe, has now presented to H. M. S. Victory a collection of documents associated with the history of the ship. The collection includes the manuscript journal of R. P. Robert, who served as a midshipman in the Victory at Trafalgar, and the naval signal book formerly in possession of Mr. John Scott Purser, secretary to Lord Nelson, who was killed in the battle. The gift has been made by Sir Leicester and Lady Harcourt as an expression of gratitude for the recovery of the King, and has been gratefully received by the Board of Admiralty on behalf of H. M. S. Victory.

TO FURTHER EDUCATIONAL SURVEY

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 16.—The first number of the Educational Survey, a publication issued under the auspices of the League of Nations Committee on Intellectual Co-operation, has just reached the Dominion. Its purpose is to review periodically the work done in different countries to make known the aims and organization of the League and to develop the spirit of international co-operation. This work, which is attracting the attention of educationists all over the world, was initiated some years ago by resolution of the Assembly. It is planned to publish the Educational Survey twice yearly if possible. The first number contains an article on an enquiry into the effect of war films on the minds of young people tending to show that realistic war films have distinctly pacifist effect.

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ELECTION IN ONTARIO THIS FALL

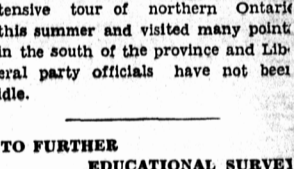

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 16.—The term of the 17th legislature of Ontario has come to an end and the Ferguson government will face the electors at the polls for the second time on October 30. Premier Ferguson announced the date of the election tonight following an afternoon meeting of the cabinet. Nominations will take place on Saturday, October 19. No changes in the cabinet are to be made before the election. The present legislature has had three sessions and comes to an end more than a year before the statutory limit of its existence. The last election was held December 1, 1926.

It was at the election of 1926 that Premier Ferguson launched his new liquor policy and secured a mandate for the repeal of the Ontario Temperance Act and the introduction of the Government Control. The liquor question promises to be one of the most interesting features of the election. It is the first election to be held since Government Control came into effect. With Progressive and United Farmers parties advocating prohibition and a prospect of some Independent temperance candidates being in the field the public will have a chance to express its opinion on the success of the new policy.

The campaign will be short. Polling day is just a little more than six weeks away. But indications are that it will not lack in strenuousness. All parties have been preparing for the fray. Conservative organization officials have been busy for months past getting the campaign machinery oiled. The Liberal leader made an extensive tour of northern Ontario this summer and visited many points in the south of the province and Liberal party officials have not been idle.
