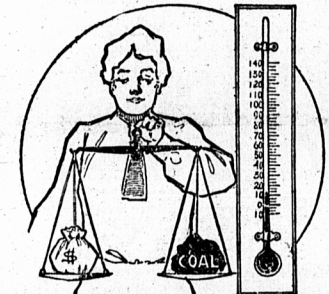

A St. John despatch says:—The committee in charge of the preparations of a prohibitory act reported to a meeting of the Temperance Federation tonight. The report was accepted in full and heartily endorsed. The Committee's report will be laid before the provincial government. The work of the committees covered some months and various temperance legislation was gone into. The new act is modelled after three which appealed most strongly to the committee, the Nova Scotia act, the Prince Edward Island act, and the Canada Temperance act. There are special features which differ from other temperance legislation in that liquor is to be distributed only by commissioners appointed by the provincial government, such commissioners to be under salary. Those receiving it will be vendors in various countries and it will only be permitted for medicinal and mechanical purposes. It provides for exceptionally heavy fines and severe terms of imprisonment for violations. Temperance men say freely that nothing is to be done and that they must have the whole act or nothing. Failing to get the government to accept it, it is said, they will put up candidates at the next election or possibly ask the opposition to make prohibition their platform.
