LUSCIOUS RECIPE FOR MINCE-MEAT

One pound currants, one pound seeded raisins, one pound seedless raisins, half pound citron peel, 1 cup cherry juice, 1 pint sweet apple cider, one-half cup orange juice, one-quarter cup lemon juice, 3 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon each of grated orange and lemon rind, 2 pounds cooked meat, chopped fine (this meat should be cooled in the liquor in which it has been boiled and then drained), 1 pound ground suet, 1 teaspoon each of cloves and allspice, 1 tablespoon cinnamon, 2 teaspoons mace, 2 table-spoons salt, 6 pounds apples, peeled, cored and diced. NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—A return to the styles of 1890, with flounces, ruffles and street-sweeping dresses is in line for 1931, according to the dictates of the garment retailers of America.

The garment men had their spring fashion promenade at the Hotel Astor Thursday night, and showed what the women of America will wear this year, from bathing suits to dance pajamas.

The pajama, it appeared, will be worn for everything but sleeping. There were beach pajamas, garden pajamas, and dance pajamas, but no plain pajamas. They were in all colors, from blue and white awning stripe duck to a bluish pink and mountain mulberry velvet combined with turquoise blue georgette.

The ballroom of the Astor was decorated for the occasion to represent a classic Greek setting. Some 1500 gentlemen of the coat-and-suit trade were assembled to see the show.

Most of the gowns for afternoon wear were several inches longer, and the dinner dresses touched the floor. Flounces were in evidence.

Red was a favorite color for sports outfits, although green was used extensively in everything. The ensemble is to be worn more this year, according to the garment men. Nearly every dress had a jacket to go with it, whether it was for sport, street, dress, or evening wear.

Velvet was used largely for evening wraps for summer wear. Materials for evening dresses were printed crepes and chiffons. There were a few laces in evidence.

The backward trend toward former styles was again shown by the presence of gingham frocks. Plaids were also conspicuous.

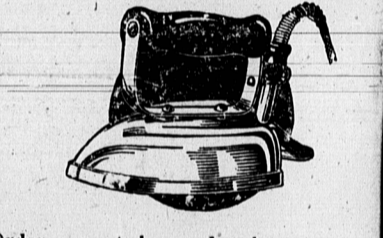

Her estate has been variously estimated at between \$20,000 and \$50,000.
