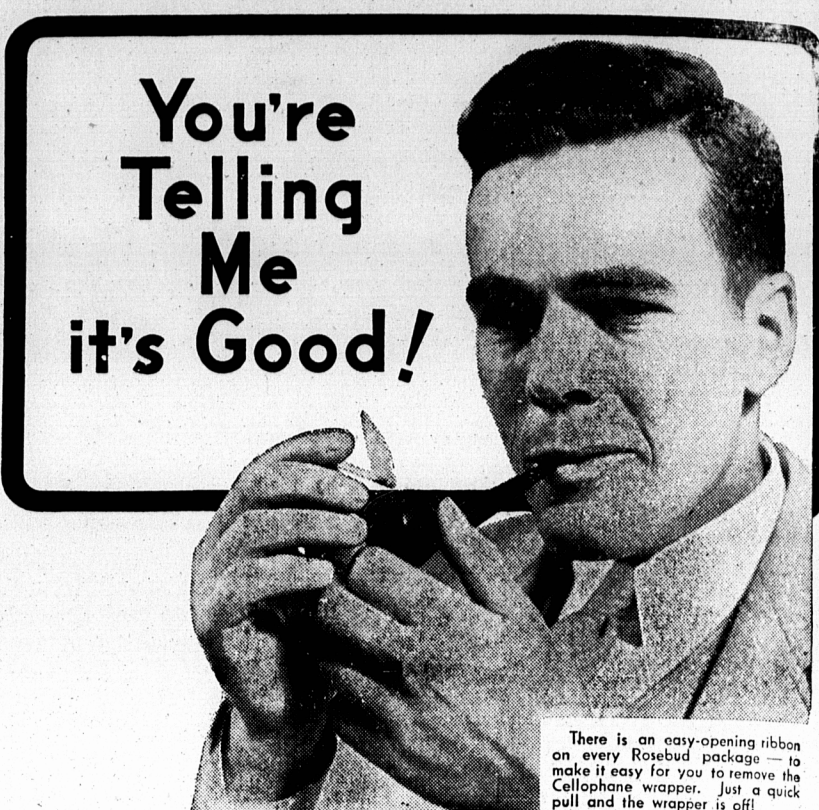
Mr. Ed Mitchell, our new Field Secretary has been asked to address Rotary on the 28th inst. He will speak on the Boy Scout Movement.

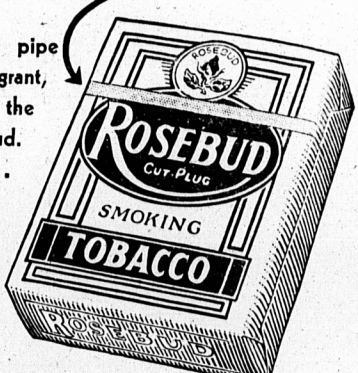
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MR. JAMES F. MACFARLANE
