The Charlottetown Dancing Academy will re-open for the season in Smallwood's Hall this Wednesday evening. Persons desirous of forming classes will do well to apply at once, as there are only two evenings per week left.

THERE was a well stocked market yesterday morning, with poultry in good supply as befitting the time near Thanksgiving Day. Prices ruled rather higher than usual, but a large amount was purchased. For price list see The Guardian's market column.

THE immense pork packing building in this city is likely to be idle again this winter. Although tenders were called some time ago for its sale it is understood that no offer was accepted, although at least one proposition was up before the trustees of the property.

THERE is a noticeable increase in the amount of shipping at the wharves the past few days. But the bare appearance the water front of the city presents in contrast with a few years ago is very noticeable, especially at this time of the year. Steamers now-a-days transport in one cargo as much as would formerly require half a dozen or a dozen schooners.

CORRESPONDENTS should remember that to ensure early appearance of correspondence all matter sent in should be cut down as much as possible. Every attention is paid to correspondence but it is impossible to get everything in as written, especially when as of late many communications are being received each day.

AFTER a complete renovation during the past few weeks, the Methodist Church at North Wiltshire will be re-opened on Sunday next (21st) when the following services will be held: Morning at 11, Rev. W. Harrison; Afternoon at 3, Rev. W. Dobson, President of Methodist Conference; Evening at 7, Rev. G. F. Dawson. The special collections on that day will be in aid of the fund for improvements.

THERE is great activity in the neighborhood of the Railway station owing to the work which is being conducted on the new station and the various railway shops in the railway yard, contracts for which have been let to A. E. Wallberg. A large number of men are busy at the various jobs, and the scene is a lively one. A number of old sheds that formerly occupied the sites are in various stages of transportation, one of them at least being more or less of an obstruction to traffic.

COL. MOORE, D. O. C. returned yesterday from Summerside where he has been looking into matters in connection with the burning of the Drill Shed in the recent fire. The shed with all its contents was destroyed. This included arms clothing and Oliver equipment. The accoutrements will total quite a sum in value, but there will be very little regret felt for the loss of the venerable old drill shed, which the Militia Department will undoubtedly replace by a modern and good looking structure.

Recent additions to the Legislative and Dodd Library have enriched the shelves to an extent of a couple of hundred volumes of most desirable books selected with great care and commendable judgment. The library is rapidly becoming a valuable factor in the education of the people. Its influence, thanks to a system of mailing, devised by the librarian, who apparently spares no efforts to extend its benefits, reaches to all parts of the Province. Decidedly no details should be overlooked so that this library shall continue to be maintained in the excellent manner on which it is at present conducted. Provision for extra help should be made as the increasing extent of the library will surely multiply the duties of the librarian and his assistants.

THE fine road leading from Grafton Street to Hillsborough Bridge which has been under construction for some time is now almost completed and provides a most excellent thoroughfare from the City to the Bridge approach proper, built so substantially and thoroughly under Dominion Government contract. The local Government has not been behind hand in supplying a roadway worthy of its importance, and the completion of the job will see a public work worthy of commendation and admiration. This is a matter highly gratifying to refer to for the place where the road has been built has for many years been most objectionable in appearance and the place of deposit for all sorts of rubbish. That is now all changed and the former unsavory character of the place has given way to a work of utility pleasing in appearance and splendidly designed to facilitate public traffic. The Commissioner of Public Works, who has taken a strong personal interest in this work, is deserving of grateful consideration in connection therewith. A large bridge has been built over the tidal stream and the road raised where needed and levelled and graded to the one level. The roadway is 80 feet wide, topped with gravel of which nearly 3000 yards have been used in making a splendid high way satisfactory in every condition. Similar treatment will be given the road leading to the approach on the Southport side of the Bridge.

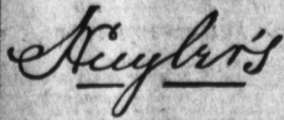

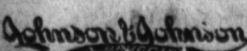
