(Continued from page one)

entirely, there was not a member on either side who would have voted for them. They all knew what the law of the land was, and they all knew that the law of the land was not to be broken. The facts which confronted them to show what had been done by this government in the matter of law enforcement. They could take any section of the country and compare the conditions existing there today with those of former years. In Montague, for instance, there was less liquor sold now than ever before in the history of the place. That could not be disputed.

In Georgetown he believed there was still some liquor sold, but there was less than before. He was not aware that there was any sold in Dundas for Moral, which were places where liquor was sold in abundance in the past. In Souris also there was a marked improvement. He had been asked what about Murray River? Well, he knew Murray River very well and he had communicated with certain statements in regard to the place, asking what he meant and reminding him that as soon as the present Government came into power they put out of business a rumshop that had been notorious for 20 years previously. He received a letter from that gentleman who informed him that they had no evidence against anybody in Murray River. The man went further and said "the Government and its officials have done for us thus far all that, as far as I know, has been asked of them in the way of enforcement of the Prohibition Act." They got all the assistance they had ever asked the Government for. He would say this much for Murray River, Murray Harbour and all along that section of the country that, considering how thickly settled they were, whatever drinking was done there it was a most sober locality. The "Patriot" a few days ago had an editorial which endeavored to show that the clergymen were against the Government and particularly against him, (Mr. McKinnon), and that a few days later three ministers had contradicted him at a meeting held in Charlottetown not long ago. He would admit that three did contradict him but he was in the happy position of having the evidence ever was open to question. He could prove beyond question he was right in every case.
