course of the sun? A couple on arriving home after marriage must encircle their dwelling three times before entering always turning to the right. Then good fortune would surely follow them—The belief in witches was quite prevalent until about two centuries ago. Witchcraft was formerly considered a crime. During the fifteenth, sixteenth and seventeenth centuries with prosecution was quite common. Some claim that the number of witches who were condemned and put to death would be numbered by millions the last execution occurring in Great Britain took place in Scotland in 1722. A witch was supposed to have influence or dealings with evil spirits or the devil in order to work a spell upon human beings or their belongings. Many of them were skilled in the black art. In Britain at one time, any aged woman who had the misfortune to be of forbidding appearance was set down as a witch, and once so declared, proof was always accumulating. According to popular belief a witch sold her immortal part to the devil for the gift of being able to change herself into certain animals and of performing many tricks mostly by way of revenge. A witch required neither auto nor aeroplane; all she needed for transportation was a broomstick on which she was supposed to fly with the speed of a bird. A witch might be skipping over the plain in form of a rabbit and at home on a broomstick. Fire-arts were believed to be effected on a witch unless the bullet silver. In the western islands of Scotland and belief in witchcraft was strong till the early years of the last century, when it slowly gave way before the advent of the age. People lived mostly near the shore, the shores were rough, the banks quite high, so that accidents were frequent and every accident was attributed to a neighboring witch. If fishermen returned empty-handed, some witch was accused. If cream refused to change into butter owing to the temperature not being right, the trouble was charged to a witch. Witches were blamed for interfering with milk more than other things, extracting the best of it and leaving nothing better than whey. They were also accused of carrying milk home in some mysterious way. According to popular belief when a child desired to sink a boat or destroy its occupants she placed a small shell afloat in a basin, then agitated the water until the shell disappeared, the boat going down at that instant. If a ship, she would bring up a squall. At one time a young man was drowned and the accident was of course charged to a witch. Some time afterwards the accused woman passed off the stage showing that she too was mortal. In process of time the youth's father became ill and was likely soon to die. His remaining son speaking to him before his death, spoke thus: "Now father in case you leave us and enter the good place above, I hope you will hunt out the black witch that killed my brother and have her expelled." Red Courier Kills One, Wounds Five

BERLIN, March 31.—A Communist courier named Mathias Klein, from Cologne, killed one man and seriously wounded five other men when, during a drunken frenzy, he fired a revolver late last night into a crowd at a Berlin suburban station.

The trouble started because Klein objected to being awakened and told that the suburban train he was on was being taken to the yards for the night. Klein first attacked the trainmen with his fists, later coming to the station and attacking the railroad men and passengers. After emptying his revolver he fled to the yards. The police finally captured him, but the crowd took him from them and beat him into insensibility.

Klein's pockets were bulging with American and Dutch money. Identification papers and other documents indicated that he had been serving the Communists as a courier for a long time, travelling between headquarters of local Communist organizations. How or why Klein was on the Berlin suburban train is unexplained. The man was unable to clear up the matter, since he was suffering from a fracture of the skull caused by the angry mob.
