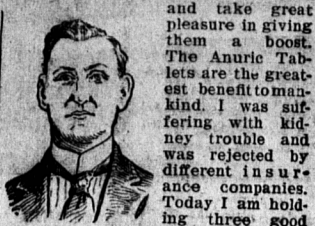

NEW YORK, March 12.—A miniature engine whose power was generated by the sun's rays, was successfully demonstrated yesterday.

The Winter of 1826

Only One Month of Hard Weather PloUGHing in January and Again in March—Interesting Facts Ninety-seven Years Ago.

(W. L. Cotton.) "Our climate is 'improving,' was a common saying of the old people of this island a few years ago.

The weather of several winters past does not bear out this conclusion—that of this winter least of all. Nor is it borne out by old-time records.

For instance, The Register, published in Charlottetown by the late Mr James Douglas Hazard, stated in the 30th of January, 1826, that "up to the 21st, the fields were all bare," and that Charlottetown was enveloped in clouds of dust.

But, it is further stated that on the evening of that day (21st January), a violent snow-storm set in and that a Peter McIntyre lost his life while trying to cross the Hillsborough River, opposite Charlottetown.

On the 4th of April of the same year it is stated by The Register: "As we anticipated in our last, the adjacent rivers are now clear of ice. There is none to be seen from King's wharf, on April 3rd the schooner Aurora cleared for Newfoundland with potatoes, oats and cattle."

In the issue of The Register of April 11th the editor states: "It is worthy of remark that in one month only (February) was there a total cessation of field labor during the winter. The months of January and March both witnessed the plough at work."

The people who live here now, particularly those whose stock of fuel is running low, in view of the snow banks of today, may well sigh for such weather as that of ninety-seven years ago!

On the other hand, the good old times were those of slow travel. The editor apologizes on 7th of February, 1826, for the scarcity of news, and remarks that there has been no intercourse with the mainland for four weeks, "owing to floating ice in the straits."

But on the 14th of February the editor exults in the fact that Mr Smith has arrived with the mails, containing letters and papers, with dates as late as the 13th of December, only two months old!

In the same issue it is announced that Captain Dodd made the run from here to Plymouth in sixteen days, and that seventy-five persons were licensed to sell spirituous liquors. It also appears that in those days the hog raiser attended to his duty; for on the 21st February, a prominent position in the newspaper is given to the statement that an unfortunate citizen was fined twenty shillings, besides forfeiting the pig, for allowing it to run at large."

About this time the pumps and wells of the Capital City began to give trouble, and a public meeting was called for the purpose of adopting a measure to have them put in order. The idea of turning a tap in the house and obtaining all the water needed was not so much as thought of in those days!

On the 21st of March there is a report of the celebration of St. Patrick's Day by the Benevolent Irish Society of which W. F. Goff was then president, "and they dined and wine at the Wellington Hotel!" At this time the question of Catholic emancipation occupied public attention in this island. In a previous session of the Legislature a resolution was submitted, setting forth that it was right and expedient to give to Roman Catholics the same privileges as were enjoyed by the Protestants. For some reason the resolution was held over until the session of 1826.

Even then the Legislature of this island, was one of the first, if not the first in Canada, to pass a bill carrying the resolution into effect.

A statement of the exports of the island in the previous year, published by the Register on the 30th

January, 1826, may be interesting to many readers of The Guardian. It sets forth that in the year 1825 there were exported:

54,277 bushels potatoes valued at £2,713.

10,717 bushels oats valued at £1,071.

766 bush. barley valued at £114; 279 oxen valued at £1,953.

13 horses valued at £195. 348 sheep and pigs valued at £374.

57 tons hay valued at £174. 416 quintals dry cod valued at £249.

464 barrels pickled fish valued at £464.

9053 tons pine timber valued at £7,814.

1,265 tons hard wood valued at £948.

530 spars valued at £132. 358 cords lathwood valued at £385.

44 m. feet deal valued at £396. 67 doz. handspikes valued at £33.

3500 staves valued at £17. 4 packages furs valued at £250.

64 m. feet boards valued at £62. 26 m. shingles valued at £11. Sundries not enumerated £66.

7,747 tons island-built shipping £77,470.

Total £95,420.

Less money for all told than obtained last year for the one of butter—not to speak of eggs cheese. It is notable, too, on March 23rd of the year 1826, there announced the arrival of the "Roncevalles" and the mare "Rlette"—also a Leicester ram.

Later in the season there a notice of the arrival of the hop of Nova Scotia and his re-union with military honors. La His Lordship was sworn in a member of His Majesty's Council of Island. Still later there arrived Excellency Lieutenant Governor Ready, who had been absent England. Apropos of this a story is told by The Register.

The morning of the 27th November, 1826, a large ship was seen entering the harbor under press of sail.

The whole population rushed to the wharves and to the banks of the river to welcome His Excellency, whose ship had been expected. A salute of seven guns was fired from the battery and excitement was at its height when it was discovered that the Governor was not on board.

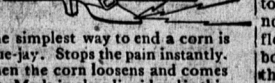
That the ship brought a lot of emigrants from Ireland. Of course these poor people were considered welcome to their new home. There can be no doubt that the land profited by these people more in the long run than it did by the return of the Governor—excellent man and administrator he was. The Governor arrived the 10th of December, and course received an address of welcome presented by a committee of the citizens. With him there was brought out a good assortment of pure bred stock, selected in England—and it is remarked that making the passage!

The Register reports that "of His Excellency's first acts was to appoint R. Gray, R. Hollis, William Townsend, and D. McKenyon to be hog reeves for the next year, and that those gentlemen—all leading citizens—exercised their authority by having a man fined £3 and costs for obstructing them in the discharge of their duty.

The following quotation from a letter to the editor shows that there were then some pessimists in this island, as there are now.

"I met yesterday a wedding party consisting of thirty or forty country people, about a mile from town on the Malpeque Road. And not only were the women all be-flounced and bedizened with ribbons and all sorts of gew-gaws, but the men—young and old—no bling less would serve them but long coats, actually coats, of broad cloth on their backs. Not a vestige of homespun was seen among them. How is it possible that the country can thrive while such wasteful extravagance exists?"

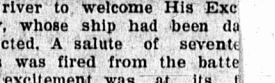
