The Edmundston and Levis Section Opened for Traffic November 23rd: A Tri-Weekly Service for the Present.

On Monday, November 23rd, the Government railways commenced to operate another section of the National Transcontinental, that between Edmundston and Levis, a distance of 237 miles. For the present there will be a tri-weekly service, leaving Edmundston at 5 a. m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday, arriving at Levis at 6.40 p. m. same day, and leaving Levis at 6.30 a. m. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, arriving at Edmundston at 8.10 p. m. same days.

Officials who have recently inspected this new section pronounce the road-bed in first class condition, and the surrounding country with excellent opportunities for the lumberman, farmer and sportsman. The Levis Edmundston and Edmundston-Moncton division of the National Transcontinental have a total of 468 miles operated by the Canadian Government Railways.

BUENOS AYRES, Dec. 1.—Despatches received from Montevideo insist that there is good reason to believe that the German squadron, which has been operating in the Pacific Ocean, is at present in the South Atlantic. (Neither the French nor the British legation has any information to confirm these reports; nevertheless private despatches gave them credence. It is related among other things that several German steamers are preparing at Montevideo to provision the warships.

DISSENSION IS RIFE AMONG THE GERMANS ON BATTLE FRONT

A TOWN IN FRANCE, (Nov. 30.)—(London Daily Chronicle Correspondent)—Forty-two prisoners have just been brought into the place where I am temporarily located, and one of them, a man of about 45 years, who spent many years in London, and up to about two weeks ago had been one of the guards at a concentration camp for British, French, Belgian and Russian prisoners told me about a bi-weekly bulletin which is issued to the prisoners at the price of one cent, the proceedings being supposed to go to the German Red Cross fund. This is printed in four languages and has already recorded the fall and destruction of Paris, an attack by Zeppelins on London, as well as the sudden death of the Czar of Russia on hearing of a great victory in Poland weeks ago. After the first few issues the circulation dropped to zero.

One of the cartoons in this journal depicts King George in company with the King of the Belgians sitting on a bench on what purports to be the cellar beneath Buckingham Palace, looking apprehensively up into the face of a huge Prussian Guardsman who with his sword drawn is directing a terror stricken servant in knee breeches and white stockings to place a large bowl labelled "gruel" on the floor beside the unfortunate monarchs. A map of Europe hangs on the wall, and "Great Germany and Ireland" are sprawled across the British Isles.

Another cartoon depicts the Crown Prince out of a gateway in Whitehall, the mounted sentries on either side being German Imperial guards, while in the background is seen a body of men, supposed to be British Life Guards, being fitted out with German uniforms and knocked into shape by a German drill instructor.

This same prisoner told me that up to a month ago he was with the majority of German soldiers had believed these things were true, but owing to a lucky (or unlucky as the case may be) capture of some recent English paper, a tiny seed of doubt was sown among the Kaiser's men, which had developed into a hardy plant, the roots of which are spreading like disease among the troops. Dissension is rife in many parts of the front, it is said. Many men are being shot by their officers for disobedience and only one day ago a whole regiment mutinied, threw down their arms and threatened to surrender to the Allied forces unless they were taken at once to the staff headquarters and their grievances attended to.

If it is true, the fact that practically all their demands were at once allowed.

The man who told me this belonged to the regiment in question. I have spoken to many German prisoners. Some of them would say anything with the idea of trying good treatment, while others would not say a word, but this man impressed me very much, and his words had the ring of truth.

A wounded French engineer tells me that much of the ground in front of the German trenches is mined and that he stumbled across one of the electric wires during a night attack. He then spent three hours searching around and cutting any other wires he could find and tracing the ends of them to batteries in the trenches. While he was doing this he got shot in the neck, the bullet going through the lobe of the left ear.

He expressed great admiration for the way in which the German engineers did their work, and was in a state of good humor because he had found what he called the electrician's parlor in one of the trenches quite a big room, all lined with timber props and full of engineering requisites, including wireless telegraphic apparatus and so forth. A well placed charge soon reduced this chamber to ruins, as the trench, though temporarily evacuated by the Germans was not in good position to be held by the French.

TRAWLER ACCUSED OF MINE LAYING

FLEETWOOD, Eng., Dec. 1.—British warships have arrested the Norwegian trawler "Nestor," which is accused of mine laying off the north coast of Ireland while flying a neutral flag.

The trawler has been docked here and her crew placed under arrest. The taking of the Nestor caused a sensation here, as she made her headquarters in Fleetwood.

WARNED AGAINST AMERICAN EGGS

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—Information has reached the Trade and Commerce Department that certain speculators in Philadelphia are buying up storage eggs, which are unfit for food according to the laws of Pennsylvania, and are shipping them to Canada, and Great Britain. They are eggs that have been more than nine months in storage.

HOISTING BRITISH FLAGS OVER APIA

How New Zealand Soldiers Captured Samoan Island of the Germans.

APIA, Samoa, Dec. 2.—The German shares of the Samoa group of Islands has been under the British flag since the first of September. The story of how this colony was captured by an expedition from New Zealand, supported by British, Australian and French warships, is one of the romances of the war. For the first time in history a self-governing dominion was permitted to act beyond its own borders with the status of an ally rather than a province of the Empire. New Zealanders are proud of the distinction and proud of the feat performed by their soldiers. They will always regard Samoa as being particularly their own property, even if it should be organized later on, as is probable, as to a separate colony.

According to a member of the Expeditionary Force, the transports left Wellington on August 15 and were met in mid-ocean by three British cruisers—the Psyche, the Byramus and the Philomet. In order to hold the German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau, which were known to be at large and charged with the safety of Samoa, a game of hide and seek was played for nearly two weeks among the islands of the Pacific Ocean. Finally, off the shores of New Caledonia, a junction was effected with the French cruiser Montcalm and the Australian cruisers Australia and Melbourne. Thus strengthened, the expedition steered boldly for Apia.

The first glimpse of German Samoa was obtained on Sunday morning, August 30. The American island of Tutuila lay to the right, just out of sight. The principal island, Upolu, was soon reached. Upolu is remembered as the scene of native wars, which led to international complications and to the final division of the archipelago between the United States and Germany. It was the home of Robert Louis Stevenson during the last years of his life. In the early 90s a terrific hurricane sent six warships and ten other vessels to the bottom, while the British Calloppe saved herself by steaming out of Apia harbor in the teeth of the gale.

The main part of the expedition remained outside, while the Psyche went on ahead and delivered a message, demanding the surrender of the town. The Germans were not to be taken in. In a remarkably brief space of time a covering party was on shore. Maxims were placed in position in the main street and cross roads and on the bridges. New Zealanders and bluejackets then marched to the government buildings. The commander, Colonel Logan, and his staff installed themselves in the government offices. The custom house and the telephone exchange were seized.

In the meantime the German flag, which had flown over Apia for fourteen years, was hauled down. The German present were painfully impressed. They doffed their hats and stood bareheaded, mournful and silent, while a New Zealand private in khaki cut the rope bringing the flag down with a high knife and threw it over his arm and carried it into the building. The hoisting of the British flag was postponed until the next day. It was made the occasion of a solemn ceremony. The troops were drawn up in three sides of the square and all the high native chiefs were present. In special invitation. The warships in the harbor fired a royal salute of twenty-one guns as the Union Jack mounted high by inch to the top of the pole. Rousing cheers for the king followed and the proclamation of annexation was read.

MANNITABA TO "OWN" THE "DAWSON TRAIL"

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 1.—The famous Dawson Trail, the earliest road into Western Canada, has been transferred by order-in-council from the Dominion Government to the Government of Manitoba. The Dawson Trail was built from the head of the lakes through the Lake of the Woods district to Winnipeg, then Fort Garry, before Confederation. It was the route of the early traders and settlers and it was over the Dawson Trail the soldiers tramped to quell the rebellion of 1870.

The trail or a portion of it is in Manitoba being transferred to the Provincial Government under a provision with the Manitoba Government, by which it was agreed that any particular traveled thoroughfares or trails existing in 1870, which the Province desired to have transferred at the time to the Province should be so transferred. The Dawson Trail was never transferred. Just why the Manitoba Government desires control of the road at the present time is not made clear in the order-in-council.

GALLANT MAJOR'S FATE UNKNOWN

LONDON, Dec. 1.—Doubt has arisen concerning the fate of Major Charles Allix Lavington Yate, of the Yorkshire Light Infantry, recently decorated with the Victoria Cross, who was said to have died while a prisoner of war.

Major Yate, a son of Colonel Chas. E. Yate, member of the House of Commons, commanded one of the two companies which remained to the end in the trenches at Leclatue. When all the other officers had been killed or wounded, and the ammunition exhausted, the Major led a charge of the nineteen survivors against the Germans.

Recently a photograph was published showing him as un wounded and a prisoner of war. A circular issued by the German Government, dated September 22, said that he had escaped from a detention camp.
