"DEAD" CHILD REVIVES AT FUNERAL SERVICE

WHIAY, Col., Nov. 5.-Marie Hesse, the three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hesse, had a remarkable escape from being buried alive after she had been pronounced dead by a physician.

The child had been ill for some time and was seized with convulsions. She lapsed into unconsciousness and apparently died. The doctor in attendance made several heart and lung tests and pronounced the child dead.

The undertaker thought the girl was dead. The child was placed in a white casket and the funeral set. After the services the family and friends approached the casket to look at the face of the supposed dead girl. One of Hesse's neighbors called attention to a faint color in the tip of the girl's ears and the funeral was stopped.

Another doctor was hurriedly summoned and he pronounced the girl alive. The child was removed from the casket and placed in bed. She has not yet regained consciousness, but is alive and the physician believes she will recover.

A COMPARISON BETWEEN CANADA AND G. B.

LONDON, Nov. 4.-Postmaster-General Samuel, on his first public appearance last night since his return from Canada, made a somewhat racy comparison of the postal and telephone services as conducted on both sides of the Atlantic. The Canadian post office, Mr. Samuel said, had impressed him in many ways, but the Canadians hadn't any government telephone to embarrass. Farnell O'Hara for Sydney with 2,700 bus. potatoes, 1,000 bus. oats, 400 bus. turnips, 100 bus. vegetables, and 20 tubs of butter; Bonus for Glace Bay with 3,000 bushels potatoes, 1,000 bushels oats, 500 bushels turnips and 150 bushels vegetables; Madonna V for Halifax with 4,400 bushels potatoes and 600 bushels turnips; Harry B for Pietou with 3,000 bushels oats and 400 bushels potatoes. The schooners Iona and Mollie are under charter and en route to Victoria to load produce for Wright Bros.

C. P. R. MEN GET A BOARD.

OTTAWA, November 4.-Over 5,000 maintenance of way employes on the C. P. R. from coast to coast want an increase in pay with better working conditions than now prevail.

Through their representatives they have made applications to the labor department for a board of conciliation to look into the dispute with the company, and Hon. T. W. Crothers, minister of labor, has consented.

The men have named Henry Irwin, of Portage La Prairie, as their representative, and the company, Wallace Nesbitt, K. C., of Toronto. A chairman will be named by the two. It is not yet been decided where the board will sit, but it will likely be in Toronto or Ottawa.

GATHERING FOR PURITY CONGRESS

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 6.-Prominent educators, ministers and social workers from many parts of the United States and Canada and from several foreign countries arrived in Minneapolis today as the advance guard of delegates to the seventh international congress of the World's Purity Federation. The sessions of the congress will begin tomorrow and continue for five days. Among the speakers will be a number of social workers and reformers of world-wide reputation.

AMERICAN LEAGUE MEETING

CHICAGO, ILL., Nov. 6.-With reports of all the baseball clubs in the circuit present, the annual meeting of the American League began here today. While the gathering of the club owners and managers is primarily to wind up the affairs of the season, just closed, several other matters of importance are scheduled for discussion. Chief of these, it is understood, are the demands of the players' fraternity and reform in connection with the world's series in football.

The Baseball Players' Fraternity, claiming to represent 80 per cent. of the major league players and also a large percentage of the players in the leading minor leagues, has come forth with a list of twenty demands to wind up the affairs of the season, unless the demands are complied with or a satisfactory compromise agreed upon the club owners are likely to meet with serious obstacles in signing up their players for next season.

Opinions expressed by some of the American League magnates before they went into session behind closed doors today indicated that they did not expect to take any formal action on the players' demands at the present meeting. The probabilities are that the entire matter will be turned over to President Ban Johnson to settle according to the dictates of his own judgment.

It is considered probable that both the American and National leagues will endeavor, at the start, to ignore the Players' Fraternity and its demands. In interviews and informal statements the club owners already have made it plain that they are disinclined to treat with the fraternity through its president and spokesman, "Dave" Fultz. Their objection to Fultz, they would make it appear, is based on the ground that he is no longer an active player and in consequence is without standing in the game. But in reality the mere mention of the name of Fultz to a club owner has been like waving a red rag in the face of a bull, ever since David organized the fraternity and succeeded in rounding up enough players to make the organization a formidable one so long as the members held together.

The players are not likely to get away from the club owners, and probably they do not expect it. But it is safe to say that if they persist in their demands and withhold their signatures from the 1914 contracts they will obtain a number of important concessions in the way of a compromise agreement.

NOGALES, Sonora, Mexico Nov. 4.-"I consider armed intervention on the part of the United States or any other power a great mistake," said Gerald Carranza, leader of the constitutionalists last night, when informed of the dispatches from Mexico City, telling of the ultimatum of the United States, demanding the immediate retirement of Provisional President Huerta.

The constitutionalist leader declined to make any further comment until he had heard from his agents in Washington.
