

"G Men" With Jimmy Cagney At The Prince Edward

Once again First National Pictures has combined the dual purpose of providing entertainment, and at the same time rendering patriotic service by showing, on the screen, a vivid story of a branch of the United States Government.

In "Here Comes the Navy," and again in "Devil Dogs of the Air," James Cagney was the star of pictures that have done an infinite amount of good by making America take real pride in its fighting forces.

Now, First National Pictures again utilizes that dynamic young star to tell the story of the ever screened of the Department of Justice agents war on organized crime.

This exciting, thrilling, yet intensely gripping drama, "G Men" had its local premiere yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre. It is a tremendous picture, and should certainly be of inestimable value in rallying public opinion to the support of the Department of Justice operatives.

The story, written by Gregory Rogers, was based on headlines that have screamed across the first pages of the nation's newspapers for the past three years, and many of the incidents are recognizable to everyone, although neither the correct names or localities are used.

"G Men" is more than a thrill-

ing melodrama—it is history as re-enacted for the screen.

James Cagney is the Department of Justice agent around whom most of the action evolves. He is who traps the Mad Dog of the Gangs, the killer whom no jail could hold, and exterminates him in a rendezvous with death.

In and out of the underworld, these G Men roam—dying and taking life, that civilized society might live safely.

Cagney has never given a better characterization, nor one that gained for him a great amount of audience sympathy. He is good, too, in the lighter side of the picture as well as in a romance with Margaret Lindsay who portrays the role of the sister of Cagney's boss, a part played by Robert Armstrong.

Ann Dvorak, who also has a leading role as the wife of Public Enemy No. 1, has another opportunity to sing and dance. She leads a night club scene and her song, especially written by the famous song writing team of Fain and Kahal, will probably be one of the season's big hits.

Others in the cast who deserve commendation are Barton MacLean, William Harrigan, Russell Hopton, Edward Pawley, Noel Madison, Monte Blue, Regis Toomey, Harold Huber, Addison Richards and Raymond Hatton.

Richard Dix In "The Arizonian" At The Capitol

"The Arizonian," the new Richard Dix starring vehicle, brings to the screen the star of "Cimarron" and "West of the Pecos" in one of the strongest pieces of his career. For those who love action, Western tradition, or who are patriotically minded, this picture is strongly recommended.

As a peace officer in an Arizona boom town, Dix is seen in a picture which calls for special attention. "The Arizonian" is not to be considered a Western picture, though it has all the action a cowboy film could hope for. Rather it is a dramatization of the West in its early days, done on a big scale which represents a wealth of genius and effort in its making. It is a departure from the history of the Western frontier. Its entertainment values lift it far above the class of a "horse opera," and its cast is one of the best balanced seen in many seasons.

The star of "Cimarron" can well be proud of his latest achievement. As Clay Tallant, a composite of a number of famous peace officers of the Western frontier, he relies on his commanding personality and strength of character to subdue the wildness of an Arizona boom town. In a friendly visit to Silver City in 1880, he encounters law and disorder, unscrupulous politicians, probwresten citizens and banditry galore. Single handed, he undertakes to purge the town. After his first victory with the energy of a notorious desperado, he helps him frustrate the crooked sheriff's efforts to halt the clean-up. Gunplay and fistfights are all in the course of a day's work for this intrepid marshal, for he has devoted his life to the creation of peace on the Western frontier.

An unusually strong supporting cast is seen in "The Arizonian." Margot Grahame, playing opposite Richard Dix, appears in her second American role. Preston Foster has one of the strongest roles in his long career as a bandit-marshal. Louie Calhern shows fine ability as the sheriff. Also in the cast are Ray Mayer, Joe Sauer, Willie Best and James Bush.

SELDEN MACLEAN

One of the most highly esteemed residents of Kingsboro passed away at the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Tuesday, August 13, 1935, in the person of Selden MacLean, aged 56 years.

Mr. MacLean had been in failing health for the past two years. He entered the above institution in April of this year for treatment, and at the end of two weeks returned to his home somewhat improved in health. But indications of the old trouble returned, necessitating his return to the above hospital on July 30th, and after an operation passed away on August 13th.

Mr. MacLean was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John MacLean of Kingsboro. Much sympathy is felt for those who survive. They are his wife, (nee Ethel MacDonald) two children, Dorothy, 8 years of age, and Harold, 10 years of age, and two brothers, Seth, Kingsboro, and William, Montague, P. E. I.

That Mr. MacLean was held in high esteem by the community in which he was born and lived, is evidenced by his funeral being the largest attended in years. His passing leaves a gap in the community as well as in his home, that will be exceedingly difficult to fill. He was a warm mechanic in carpentry and in other spheres of usefulness he had few, if any equals. He also operated a saw mill to the satisfaction of his customers. He was a worthy citizen, a devoted and faithful husband and father. His was a courageous throughout all his sickness, and optimistic to the last.

Services at the home and South Lake Church were conducted by Rev. H. R. Bell, Mr. Elmer Farnell, Amherst, N.S. rendered valuable service in song. He sang "The Christian's Good Night," and was accompanied by Miss Erma MacGregor. A quartette composed of Miss Martha Robertson, Miss Erma MacGregor, Mr. Stewart MacGregor, Mr. Joshua MacDonald, sang effectively Mr. MacLean's favourite hymn, "No Night There." Miss Grace Dingwell officiated at the organ throughout the service. After the service interment was made in South Lake Cemetery. The pall bearers were: Joshua MacDonald, Barton MacDonald, F. J. Mossey, John A. Stewart, Harold Kennedy, Willard Stewart.

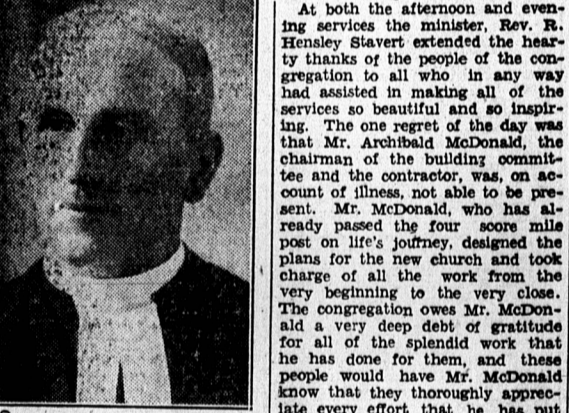
Reopening New Presbyterian Church Murray Harbour

The re-opening services of the new Presbyterian Church at Murray Harbour South which has just been completed, were held on Sunday, August 18th, and were largely attended. There were three services in all, 11 a.m., 3 p.m., and 7:30 p.m. At the evening service many were not able to secure admission. The extreme heat of the day prevented numbers who had planned to come—especially those from a distance—from being present.

The minister, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, M.A., B.D., conducted morning service throughout and presided at each of the other two services. At the afternoon services Mr. Stavert was assisted by Rev. T. Owen Hughes of Montague and Cardigan, and in the evening by Rev. C. E. Armstrong of Montague, minister of the Christian Church at Murray Harbour South, and by the Rev.
