PREMIER KING MAKING PLANS RE CORONATION

Prime Minister Con-
fers With Palace and
Government Officials.

OTTAWA, Oct. 18—Canada's participation in the coronation of His Majesty King Edward VIII in London on May 12 next should be clarified on the return of Premier King to Ottawa early next month. Mr. King, it is presumed, will be in consultation with Buckingham Palace officials, with the British Government and with Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner, who is a member of the sub-committee of the overseas Dominions as to coronation arrangements. To date, as far as Ottawa is concerned, nothing but mystery enshrouds the possible extent of Canada's representation at the coronation ceremonies.

There is to be an Imperial Conference right after the coronation so, of course, Premier King and possibly a half dozen ministers will make the trip to London.

Hon. C. A. Dunning, Finance Minister; Hon. W. D. Euler, Minister of Trade and Commerce; Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture, and Hon. J. L. Isley, Minister of National Revenue, will likely be included in the Government delegation.

Whether His Excellency, Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor-General, will attend the coronation has not yet been decided. Under new regulations touching the office of Governor-General, it is now possible for the incumbent of that post to leave the Dominion for as long as 30 days without the necessity of an administrator being appointed. The Chief Justice, Sir Lyman Duff, could act as deputy of the Governor-General for the period of such absence.

It is considered likely that the Speakers of the two Houses of the Canadian Parliament, Hon. W. E. Foster, of Saint John, of the Senate, and Hon. Pierre P. Casgrain, K.C., of Montreal, of the Commons, will attend. They would likely be attended by their clerks, A. E. Blount, K.C., of the Senate, and Dr. Arthur Beauchesne, K.C., C.M.G., of the Commons, as well as Major Drew Thompson, gentleman usher of the black rod; and Major M. F. Gregg, V.C., sergeant-at-arms of the Commons.

It is understood also that possibly 15 members of the Commons and also 15 members of the Senate will be selected in due course to represent those two bodies.

No decision has been reached concerning a Canadian military contingent to the coronation, but it is fully expected one will be sent. Arrangements will also be made for May 12 to be declared a public holiday throughout Canada with special observances of the day in the chief cities of the Dominion to coincide with the coronation ceremony in Westminster Abbey in London.

Whether any of the nine provincial premiers or mayors of the chief cities of the Dominion will attend the coronation will likely depend on their own decision.

Harold Bell Wright's Novel "The Mine With The Iron Door" At Capitol

Harold Bell Wright searched into
the romantic legends of the
Early West for the idea from which
he fashioned the fascinating story
of "The Mine With the Iron Door,"
a novel that was read and loved by
two generations of Americans. The
tale has a clean, wholesome, virile
appeal lamentably lacking in most
modern fiction. For this reason it
is a pleasure to heartily recom-
mend the screen version of "The
Mine With the Iron Door," which
opened yesterday at the Capitol
Theatre, starring Richard Arlen
with Cecilia Parker and Henry B.
Walthall in support.

Richard Arlen portrays a young
salesman who is high-pressured into
buying a piece of Arizona mountain
property. A dumb detective, who has

Canadian Girl Guide Week

Lone Guides are girls living often
in isolated rural areas, who are un-
able to attend company meetings.
They 'belong' to a Lone Company
where the company work and fun
is carried on by correspondence
and an occasional meeting with a
Lone Guide or with other Guides.
The company letters are evolved
by the Lone Captain by the use of
scissors paste and old magazines as
well as personal notes. They are
always interesting, and brings to
the Lone Guide a great desire to
meet the writer, and the other
Guides of her Lone Patrol. Some
Lones live 200 miles from the
nearest company, some have never
seen another Guide. Others have
been able on special occasions to
get by horseback to a meeting.
Two Lones received a great thrill
last summer, when the Chief
Guide went across Canada, to be
enrolled by her as she stopped at
a wayside station. One Lone Guide
in Canada lives in a lighthouse,
but she feels in close touch with
other girls because she belongs to
a Lone Guide Company.

The Extension Branch of the
Girl Guides was organized to bring
to physically handicapped girls the
joy of playing the game of Guiding
with their normal sisters. There
is no greater tragedy for the young
than being 'left out', and almost
inevitably the handicapped girl
misses a great deal of enjoyment
because she cannot do what other
children do. One door stands open
to her just as widely as to her
more fortunate normal sister—the
chance to become a Girl Guide.

Extension companies are organ-
ized and run exactly the same as
ordinary ones, competitions being
entered and regular tests taken
wherever possible. Stress is always
laid upon what the girl can do
rather than dwelling on her dis-
abilities, thus enriching her life by
opening to her new possibilities.
Such companies exist in institu-
tions for the blind, deaf and men-
tally deficient, also in hospitals
particularly convalescent ones
where the children stay for some
time. One children's hospital in
Canada has a company from 10
to 24 meeting each week. What
does it matter if you are on your
back in bed, you can still sing and
take part in things!

Extension Guiding also seeks
out the handicapped girl who is
at home. She is called a Post Guide
because all her meetings are by
way of the Post Office. Such fas-
cinating letters as she gets from
her Captain, outlining what she
should do, explaining things to
her and all illustrated with little
pictures and drawings. After read-
ing this lengthy letter, she mails it
on to another girl in her company.

Extension companies, when they
camp, have special care, and they
also enter district competitions
often winning against ordinary
Guide companies.

A unique example of Extension
Guiding exists in the Leper House
at Perulia, India. These girls suf-
fering from various stages of lep-
rosy have found great happiness
in their Guide work, which helps
to broaden their too limited hori-
zon by giving them new interests.

ANTHONY ADVERSE At Prince Edward

The long awaited production of
"Anthony Adverse," filmed from
Hervey Allen's cyclopean novel,
