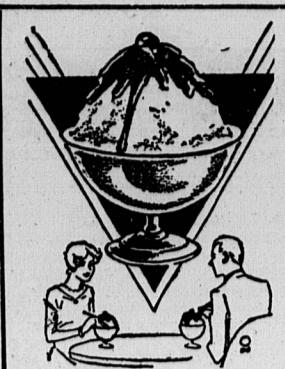

### THE SPECIAL SESSION

Sir,—The tail of a snake which moved after the reptile was mangled to death is said to have inspired an Irishman's remark:—"Faith and it's dead enough, but the cratcher don't know it."

The Patriot, the tail of its defunct party, still moves and talks as if life still prevailed. It doesn't seem to know that its power to command has ceased indefinitely. It is apparently dull to appreciate this wholesome Irish wit. On August the 1st it published a catalogue of 23 items which it alleged to be pledges of Hon. Mr. Bennett to the people. There is no doubt that the New Premier will implement every promise of his election campaign - and with business-like ease.

But his attention will be to his own pledges - and not those placed as his in a defeated and irresponsible press.

For instance the local Liberal dreamer said—"Hon. Mr. Bennett promised to end unemployment."

Hon. Mr. Bennett made no such promises - only the most arrant of fools would do so, and the new Premier is not a fool. What he did promise was that he would call a special session to deal with unemployment."

He further claimed, very properly, that the King Government policy was contributory to unemployment, and with sound justification, that the Conservative policy would contribute to greater employment.

Let history tell its tale - and repeat itself. From 1873 to 1878 a Liberal government ruled at Ottawa. Never in Canada's history was unemployment greater. Soup kitchens fed the hundreds of thousands out of work from Atlantic to Pacific. Crime was rampant and human life endangered by starving multitudes, who would kill and rob for a few dollars to sustain life.

Sir John MacDonald offered his National Policy as a panacea for this industrial distress. The people returned him to power. Even before his government commenced to function, times commenced to improve. Manufacturers, with the pledge of protection in sight, at once commenced to get busy enlarging factories and improving equipment - giving immediate employment to large numbers.

Business generally donned the garments of optimism, and with the promise of new life, branched out into larger enterprises. And for the balance of Sir John's lifetime, Canada forged ahead into a prosperity which even Liberalism has not been able to wholly destroy.

May we predict that today, following the verdict of the people, with a stabilized government, and a guaranteed policy of Canada for Canadians, industrial and agricultural interests will be clothed with renewed confidence, and that immediately as the outcome of that confidence unemployment will ease off and more labor employed, based upon the employers faith in the Bennett administration.

To wholly eliminate unemployment is beyond the capacity of any government, but to reduce it to minimum is the Conservative pledge - and the whole country has confidence that this will be done with as great speed as the machinery of government and parliament can get into working order.

The special session is only designed as a preliminary to grapple with the more pressing of present needs. The greater and more permanent results must come from the working out of the protective system, which will involve legislation and departmental operation. This can not become effective in a day. But with the promised security to our industrial life the near future should, and, we believe, will produce an early betterment in business and employment conditions.

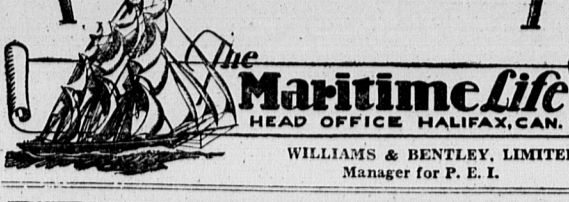
