JOHN Henderson, sixty-five years old, for the past six years employed as carpenter at Mechanic's Building, Boston, died at his home 167 Willow Ave., West Somerville, Mass., of pneumonia, at four o'clock Saturday afternoon, March 12, after an illness of one week. Mr. Henderson was born in Newfundland, but until fifteen years ago when he removed with family to Massachusetts, he lived since infancy in Murray Harbour, P. E. I., where he always retained his membership in the local Presbyterian church. The family resided in Brighton, Mass., until four years ago when they removed to Willow Ave., West Somerville. Mr. Henderson was an attendant at the Presbyterian church on Berkeley St., Boston. The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock. There was a large attendance and the floral tributes were numerous. Rev. J. Vanor Garton officiated. The funeral was at Woodlawn cemetery and the pall bearers were: John McKay, Wm. J. Graham, George Richards and J. M. Miller. In addition to a widow Mr. Henderson leaves two sons, William T. and George W. of Somerville and a daughter Mrs. H. S. Gilebrist of Beachmont; an aged mother, two brothers William and Edward, three sisters Mrs. James Richards, Mrs. Fred Higginbotham and Mrs. John White of Murray Harbour, P. E. I., also three other sisters, Mrs. Hector Bruce of Truro, N. S., Mrs. James A. Finley of Alliston, Mass., and Mrs. John Arnold of Providence, Rhode Island. (Other papers please copy.)
