alliance with the Liberals. The motives which have actuated the Manitoba Liberals in making this illogical pact with the Progressives are based on the only political strategy that seems to lie open to them. In the provincial House they are in a hopeless minority, and have no visible prospect of improving their position. The defeat of the Bracken Government could not by any possibility open the way to a Provincial Liberal regime, but would inevitably result in the accession to office of the Conservative party, under Major Taylor's leadership. Such a turn of political events at this juncture would simply be disastrous to the Federal Liberal party in Western Canada and would preface clearly the overthrow of the King Ministry at the next election. For these reasons the Liberals at Ottawa, through the advice of Hon. Charles Dunning, gave their earnest blessing and sanction to the Liberal-Progressive rapprochement at Winnipeg. The deal has had the immediate result of postponing the Manitoba provincial election till after the Federal election. Whether this will advance or prejudice the chances of the King Government in the West is an exceedingly doubtful question. But it has, at least, saved that Government from the tremendous loss of prestige it would have suffered in the rest of Canada if Manitoba had, like Saskatchewan, passed over to the Conservatives on the eve of a Dominion election.

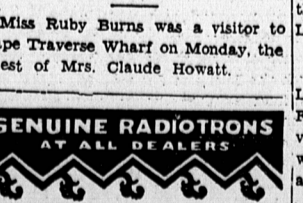

Mrs. William Bell of Summerside, is spending a few days with relatives in Victoria.

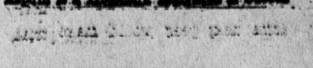

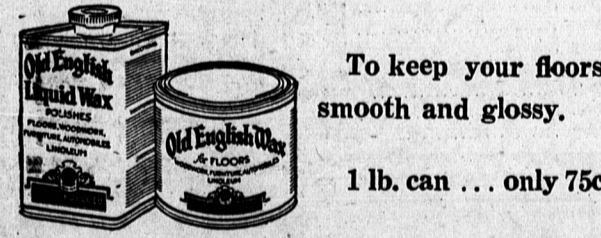
