WINNIPEG, Dec. 7.—With the advent of wintry weather here, health department officials have been kept on the jump investigating reports of cold houses and apartment blocks, and the advisability of seeking legislation for a minimum amount of heat in apartment blocks and rooming houses is now under consideration by the department. Very few instances have been found, however, where buildings were cold enough to endanger the health of the residents, but many are living in discomfort through lack of heat.

Other cities have been queried on the matter of regulated temperature by-laws and it is learned that Chicago is the only one with a law of this kind in force. The by-law is general in its terms.

Foreign Buyers Took Advantage Of Mark's Drop

COBLENZ, Germany, Dec. 7.—German newspapers for weeks have been waging a campaign of protest against what is termed the "selling out of Germany" to foreigners who have invaded the country to purchase goods since the mark began its sharp decline early in October.

The mark has fallen in value much faster than the prices advanced, and as a consequence, thousands of speculators have been attracted to Germany to take advantage of the situation.

In the occupied area the influx of foreigners became so great within a few days that the Allied authorities soon decided that some concerted action was necessary to protect the residents.

The president of the Rhineland province, acting under direction of the Inter-Allied Rhineland High Commission, issued a decree prohibiting purchase of merchandise by foreigners not actually residing within the territory of occupation. This order does not affect members of the Allied military forces, the Rhineland commission says, but foreigners who were in the occupied area on legitimate business.

STEEP DEMAND NECESSARY

Officials deemed that this step toward trade regulation was necessary to prevent retailers from selling all their stocks to foreigners taking advantage of the low rate of exchange on foreign currencies at a time when the price on goods in the German stores had not been advanced, or at least not marked up in comparison with the depreciation of the German money.

For days buyers poured into the Rhineland on every train, and by automobile from Holland, Belgium, Luxembourg, France and other nearby countries, and business in the stores of Coblenz, Cologne and Aix-la-Chapelle flourished as it never had before. The foreigners bought everything on sale and in whatever quantity could be procured with the retailer. This abnormal demand for goods continued for days and reached such a stage at times that store-keepers found it necessary to close their doors, because of the crowds or because the shelves were empty. Clerks worked 16 and 18 hours a day trying to keep up with the demand.

Many articles of American manufacture are on sale in Coblenz stores at retail prices much lower than in the United States, taking into consideration the rate of exchange. It is explained here that these goods came from surplus army stocks in France which at various times since the armistice have been disposed of by the United States liquidation commission to Germans and merchants of various other countries.

Marriage Was Duty

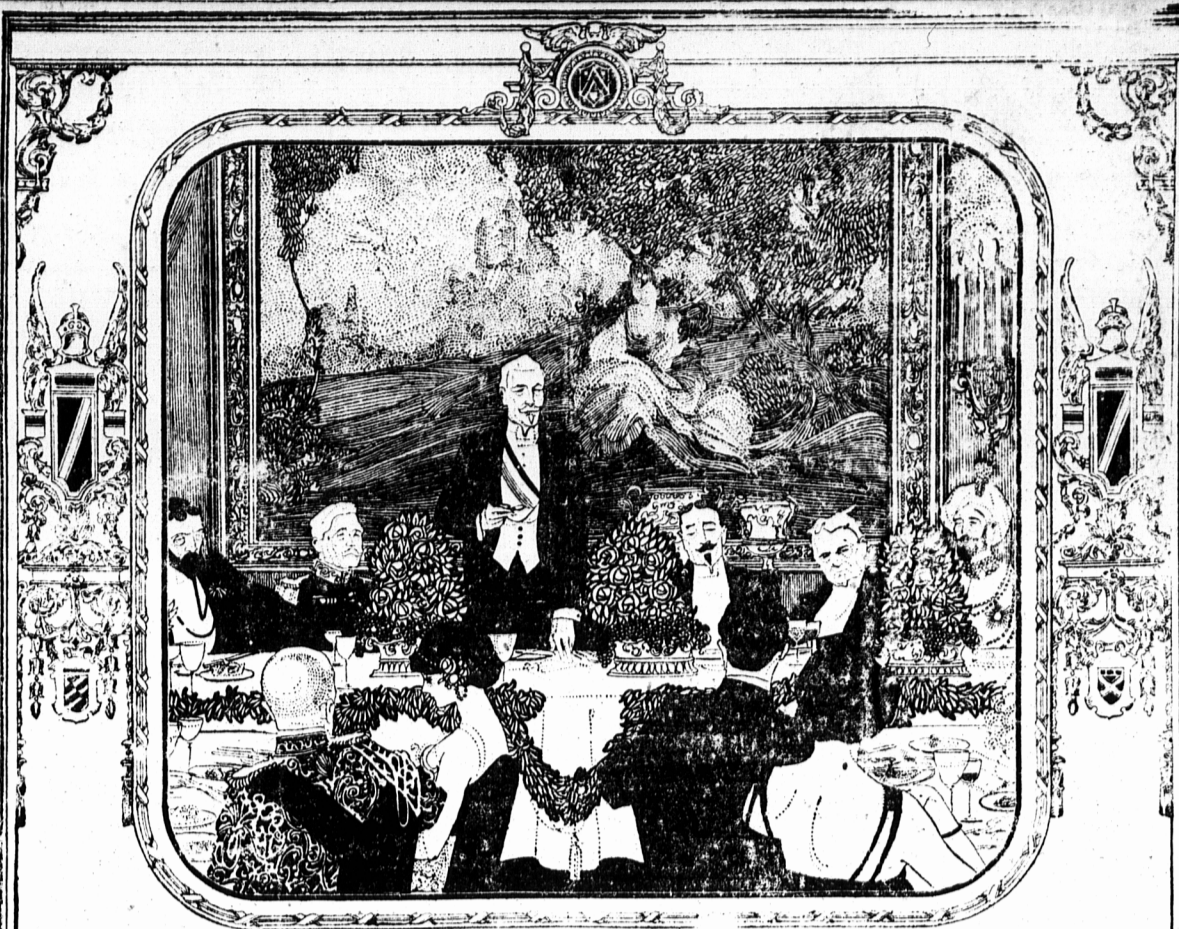
TOKIO, Dec. 7.—A series of articles on love and marriage is appearing in Japanese newspapers, and magazines, as a sign of the modern tendencies of the new Japanese mentality. Professors in psychology, school teachers and writers of note are prominent in this discussion of the reforming of the old matrimonial system, all advocating more freedom for personal choice.

According to the old custom, the parents choose bride and bridegroom and the marriage was performed without the interested parties having known each other, her mother-in-law.

Marriage was considered a duty towards country and family, the religion of ancestor worship being its principle. The young couple lived with the parents and the bride owed complete obedience to her mother-in-law.

The custom is now prevalent for the young people to meet long before the marriage takes place, so that they may know each other, and to live apart from the family till the wedding, and notorious family dissensions are no longer considered undutiful.

Hence the discussion for greater liberty and more social life which are quite opposed to the old social system of Confucius, that men and women should keep apart and marry for duty's sake and not for love.

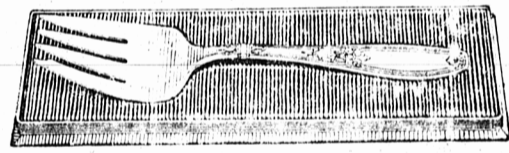
