TORONTO, June 9.—(CP)—Five  
non-commissioned officers and men  
of the 7th Toronto Regiment, Royal  
Canadian Artillery, were paraded

men's presence at a Fascist meet-  
ing last Monday.

has been taken.

diers tendered a Fascist salute.

TORONTO, Ont., June 9.—The week-end was cordially welcomed by the fathers and brethren, affording as it did, a respite from the strenuous days of debate and committee work on their ecclesiastical business and giving them a breathing spell out-of-doors preparatory to the completion of their heavy docket of the coming week-end. Schoolboys were directed to avail themselves of the many delightful engagements provided by the committee on entertainment.  
A fleet of automobiles was at their disposal to take them to the city or in the country near and far which at this season of the year is radiant in its beauty of lawns and trees. Of special interest was the trip to Paris, 70 miles from Toronto, where is situated "Penmarvian" the magnificent home of the late John Penmarvian, who bequeathed this valuable estate and residence to the Presbyterian Church in Canada as "a home for sick and retired ministers and missionaries and their wives." It was opened to guests in November last and the comfort and privileges of this beautiful place.

**SUSTENATION FUND**

**STATE LOYALTY IS STRESSED**  
The State stands beside the Church as a Divine institution, Dr. Robert Johnstone, Ottawa, said yesterday in his sermon at Calvin Church here, assembly church of the annual assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Dr. Donald MacDunn, Brockville, moderator, presided at both morning and evening services in the church. Rev. James McNeill, St. John's Newfoundland, preached last night. Loyalty to the State is sadly neglected today, Dr. Johnstone told the capacity congregation. "While we dare not suggest, 'My country, right or wrong, I believe we are in sore need today of our old and truly-tried nationalistic loyalties.' The preacher disagreed with the belief he found in some quarters that the words of Jesus Christ contained revolutionary doctrine. "Jesus Christ was no leader of a political or social revolution," he declared. "He was a loyal patriot, as shown in his quotation from the scriptures: 'Render unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's.'"  
Dr. Johnstone declared loyalty to the Home, to the State and to the Church were the fundamentals of Christian worship.  
Touching on the tendency of some Christians to go to church merely to stand well socially in the community, the preacher deplored the use of God's house as a "social step-ladder."  
"Maybe you haven't got it in Toronto," he said, "but let me assure you that we have it in Ottawa and I say with sincerity: 'From all such let the Lord deliver us.'"
