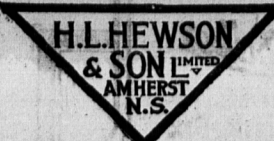

NO DOUBT REGARDING HOLDING OF OLYMPIC TRIALS IN CH'TOWN

Owing to some misunderstanding regarding the Olympic Trials for the Maritime Provinces, the announcement was made in mainland papers that the Trials would be held in Moncton.

After burning up the wires to the extent of several dollars for the past two days, Doc. Yeo the "Sport King," and "Toby" McMillan, have definitely arranged to stage the big event here on July 1st, Dominion Day.

These Olympic events will in part determine contestants who will go to the great Olympic meet in Stockholm, Europe, at which place the greatest athletes in the world will meet in mighty contests of speed and brawn.

Now that the Maritime Trials have been definitely awarded to Charlottetown, the sporting fraternity of this city is assured of a big day on July 1st. The Trials involve as heavy financial burden, including a guarantee to the General Olympic Fund by which Canada's athletes are financed in their European trip.

The Olympic events will include the following:

100 yds dash, 220 yds. dash, quarter mile run, half mile, one mile, five miles, shot put, hammer throw, discus throw, 56 pound weight throw, javelin hurling, hurdles, three mile walk, high jump, broad jump, standing broad jump, pole vault and relay race, (four men.)

Gold and silver medals will be awarded in each event. The holding of this great contest should stimulate all Island athletes to perfect themselves in every line of athletic endeavor so that this province may have a representative in the world's meet in Europe.

Frank H. Hitchcock

Although General Leonard Wood declared on his arrival in Chicago that there was entire harmony in the ranks of his followers, he had not smoothed out the relations of his campaign managers. Colonel William C. Procter and Frank H. Hitchcock. Mr. Hitchcock had stated previously that his work was advisory and supervisory. His friends believed that General Wood should avail himself to a greater extent of Mr. Hitchcock's experience in handling affairs at national conventions. He managed the Taft campaign for the presidential nomination in 1908 and was chairman of the Republican National Committee in 1908-09.

KITCHENER'S ATTITUDE.

For a soldier, Kitchener's attitude was a surprising one, but his standpoint was a very simple one. The two Republics were to come within the British Empire—just as Germany is to come now within the League of Nations—and he believed that they would be a most valuable element in its composition. He was, therefore, convinced that neither legalism nor war passion should stand in the way of peace. Indeed, if he had had his way, the war might have been ended twelve months before it was!

ready to agree that the rebels should be defranchised, but since they had risen to aid the Boer Republics he would not consent that they should be exposed to the rigors of the law for the son, Lord Kitchener carried the day, and so Kitchener was left to declare "we are now carrying the war on to put two or three hundred Dutchmen in prison at the end of it. It seems to me absurd and wrong." According to Sir George Arthur, his biographer Lord Kitchener was wont to remark, "I think I shall be of some real use when peace comes. I have little fear as to our final victory, but many fears as to our making a good peace."

How thankful we should all be that the Kitchener rather than the Milner spirit has so far pervaded the Conference!—Glasgow Weekly Herald.
